





Wildcat! 4.1: 0S/2 Support and More

BAKERSFIELD, CA — Hot on the paws of last year's 4.0 is the new Wildcat!, Mustang Software's mega-hit BBS package that now boasts enhanced OS/2 support, a multi-database file system and a full-screen ANSI-based file listing mode.

• The OS/2 update is the most significant addition to this Wildcat!, version 4.1, for it's been upgraded to support direct communications with OS/2's serial drivers for sysops running boards as a DOS process under OS/2.

Additionally, 4.1 sysops can use intelligent multi-port serial cards from Digiboard, Inc. and other enhanced serial devices having OS/2 drivers in an OS/2 environment.

• A new feature in the CD-ROM department gives sysops the power to define groups of file areas on their boards. These so-called "file groups"

can consist of any collection of file areas defined by the sysop, with each group having a separate database. Adding a new CD-ROM of downloadable files under 4.1 becomes simple as plopping in a pre-configured database.

Mustang's President Jim Harrer said in a media announcement that "we have created a system that gives the sysop many of the features of popular CD-ROM doors without sacrificing the speed and ease-of-use built into Wildcat!."

It's up to the caller to select the groups and then list, search and download files. As for

the sysop, his job of processing requests for offline files is easier now because the task can be automated with the upgraded version of the wcFILE database utility (included).

 In full-screen file-listing mode (ANSI Lister) callers can browse the

file bases using the arrow keys to mark files for download by just striking the spacebar.

According the Mustang, single-line, two-line and extended file listing modes are also available, with each caller getting to pick his or her favorite.

Using Aldus Rev 1 graphic filters (which Thumbs+Plus automatically locates on the drive) users can also view Micrographx Designer/Draw files, Lotus 1-2-3 pictures, Mac PICT files and AutoCAD Plot and Exchange files.

Furthermore, using OLE, the program can thumbnail and view any file for which an OLE server is present on the system. These could include HP Graphics Language (HGL), Video for Windows (AVI), and Word for Windows (DOC).



Benefits of Mac in Windows

LAGUNA BEACH, CA — Mac envy. Plenty of Windows users experience it, but until recently (except for a few shareware attempts) there's been little

they could do short of switching parties to Apple. Now Silver Wolf Productions has come up with a bridge called Silver Wolf Desktop (SWD) that "brings the folder/document metaphor to Windows."

What that means is Windows users can now display directories as folder windows and files as document icons—something expected with next fall's (?) Windows 95.

The working environment of SWD's Windows consists of a menu bar at the top of the screen containing commands to manage your system, all available drives along the right edge as icons (including networks and CD-ROMs), configurable command icons along the bottom for commonly used applications, and

disk directories as folder windows whose contents may be shown as icons, text, or lists.


"SWD can be run from Program Manager or File Manager directly, placed in Program Manager's startup group, in the WIN.INI 'run' or 'load' lines, or it can replace Program Manager as the Windows 3.1 shell," said Mark Daly, manager of product support at Silver Wolf, "giving the user complete control over how much change they want, and when."

Novell's WebPerfect

PALM SPRINGS, CA — In the race to get hypertext markup language (HTML) development kits to the public in a simple, all-in-one package integrated into a familiar word processor, WordPerfect seems to be the somewhat unlikely





front-runner.

Novell, Inc. announced in February the development of WordPerfect Internet Publisher for Windows, a free add-on to WordPerfect 6.1 that allows users to create and view documents on the World Wide Web without a lick of experience with HTML. Microsoft's tool, Internet Assistant, offers some but not all of these benefits.

The company is also planning WordPerfect Internet Pro for Windows, dubbing it an open solution that provides users with "seamless connectivity to the Internet from within WordPerfect 6.1."

"With a simple click of a button on the WordPerfect 6.1 toolbar, Internet users will be able to create, publish and view information anytime, anyplace," said Mark Calkins, general manager of Novell's Business Applications Division, in a somewhat oversimplified description.

The program provides a template that guides users through the process of creating an HTML document, and a conversion program automatically converts the WordPerfect document into a native HTML file.

Features like hypertext links, graphics and bullet lists are all available through the toolbar.

NetScape Navigator (a Web browser) is included with integrated WordPerfect and Envoy viewers, which lets users publish directly on the Web in native WordPerfect or Envoy formats.

The Internet Publisher Pro on CD-ROM provides everything in Internet Publisher plus dial-up Net access software from Novell's LAN Workplace product, and a trial subscription to any of several Internet service providers.

Wanted: PCBoard Sysops

SALT LAKE CITY, UT — In an effort to bring further support and promotion to PCBoard and its sysops, Clark Development Company has established Team PCBoard.

The "team" is being made up of volunteer PCBoard enthusiasts to share their knowledge and enthusiasm with other users and potential users.

"PCBoard sysops are proud of their choice for BBS software," said Steve Klingler, general manager of CDC, "and they are well known for their willingness to help others."

Klingler said the team provides an avenue for CDC to recognize sysops who have gone out of their way to help support the software.

To join the team, volunteers must log on to Salt Air BBS and type "TEAM" from the main board prompt. After filling out a questionnaire, logos and taglines are provided for download.

15.21 UPDATE — The latest version of PCBoard, 15.21, touts an integrated Fido mailer/tosser. The advancement provides a transparent front-end on PCBoard BBSs allowing for seamless Fido logins invisible to callers.

"PCBoard silently monitors the login process and passes control to the builtin Fido mailer if a Fido handshake is detected," said Klingler. Additionally, the mailer allows PCBoard to support multiple networks so callers can participate in the official Fidonet as well as their private Fido technology networks. And the simultaneous multinode design allows the BBS to handle several Fido callers at once.

The tosser supports Fido and non-Fido specific echoes, Netmail, and provides for secure conference access.

IMAGinE Net BBS sysop Alfonse Vicente said the new system "is great because there is no need to have a complicated set of programs and batch files to have Fido technology networks in a PCBoard-based BBS."

And further, noted Vicente, due to the mailer/tosser being built in, PCBoard's import and export speed is extremely fast.

"With this new method of exporting and importing mail," he said, "it almost continuously permits nodes and hubs to have new mail ready to be sent to the networks."

1. From the Top

Quick update — Operating since the late '70s, bulletin board services have recently enjoyed an explosion of popularity and acceptance. Each day senior citizens, children and people of all ages in between share the same virtual meeting ground — a kind of mall without walls, parking problems or annoying salespeople — using their telephone lines and personal computers as a catalyst. They call bulletin board services to interact, to retrieve information and software, to play games with others calling in at the same time. Now it's your turn.

Starters — You'll need three things to get started: a computer, something called a modem and a little patience.

Let's assume you already have that first one. And if you bought it within the past year or so you more than likely already have the second—a modein.

Short for modulator-demodulator, the modem simply takes the language of the computer and translates it into a language that can be sent through your telephone line, then translates it back on the other end where the BBS's modem resides — in an office or, sometimes, the bedroom of the BBS operator.

Your modem might be a little black box (looking something like an automobile radar detector) or it could be built into the computer. If you don't see the box, check the back of your computer for something resembling the telephone jack in your house (refer to the booklets that came with the computer for help). Once you find it, simply plug a telephone cord into the assigned opening and attach the other end to the wall jack. Now you're almost ready.

Software - Your computer can't "speak" directly to a BBS

without another kind of translator. This one is called a communications or terminal program. There are plenty of them available from BBSs, but we haven't gotten there yet so you'll need to go back to the documentation that came with your computer, find the booklet referring to your modem and see if it discusses anything about a communications program (many modems come packaged with this software). Once you find it, follow the instructions for opening the program. This will bring us the next step: setup.

Open the terminal or communications program and enter the BBS number.





Wait! I can't find it! — Before we get to setting things up, it's possible some of you might not have found the program. If this is the case, give a call to Mustang Software (800-999-9619) and request a free evaluation copy of their communications program called Qmodem, Mark your spot and get back to us when you receive it.

The Windows Link — If you have Microsoft Windows running on your computer, on the other hand, you can get started right away (see page 14).

To do this open the Accessories group and click on Terminal. Now we're ready.

Go to Settings on the menu across the top and select Communications. Other communications software will have similar "settings" to fill out. The first thing so select is the appropriate "baud rate" (different from BPS, or bits per second — but often confused baud loosely refers to the rate of speed information can travel between your modem and the BBS). Check the modem's booklet to find your modem's baud rate, then click the corresponding circle

For brevity's sake, we'll take a chance and just select eight "data bits," "no parity," set "flow control" to Xon/Xoff and choose one "stop bit." These are common settings and will likely work for you.

Now comes the "Connector," or communications port. Again, it's probably safe to choose COM2. Click OK. If the correct port is selected (using Windows), the window will disappear taking you back to the Terminal. If this is incorrect, Windows will tell you, in which case you should try COM1

T Minus 5...4...— Finally, it's time to make a call. First thing you'll need is a telephone number for a local BBS. If you don't have one in mind, check the annotated list in the back of the magazine for one in a town near you. Or try one of the BBS software manufacturer's support BBS numbers listed at the end of this primer.


Once you have the number, select Setting and then Phone Number and enter the number. A similar procedure is provided in most communications software, including Qmodem.

Now select Dial or OK. Depending on your setup, the modem might be respond with a dialing sound, or it might be silent. If your modem is an external device, the lights across its front should also be reacting.

Now your address and personal details.

2. The First Connection

When the dust settles, you should be getting some kind of welcoming message transmitted to your monitor from the BBS: "Hello and welcome to John Smith's BBS." If so, congratulation are in order—you made your first connection.

Now that you're online, you will need to introduce yourself and answer a few questions.

The first thing you'll likely be asked for is your name and password. Since this is your first time, you obviously don't have a password to offer, so follow the basic instructions the BBS provides for "New Users".

Mine is Different Than Yours— Remember, there are many different brands of BBS software, and each acts a little differently. However, the basics are pretty similar in that they'll require your full name, address, telephone number, requested password and comments.

Don't be too concerned ahout giving these out. BBS operators (or sysops) likely won't be calling to solicit or bother you. Quite the contrary—they want to get you on board and keep you there, not scare you away.

The BBS will also ask for some technical information about your computer and terminal settings. But don't worry, a good BBS will offer the most common "default" settings—select them.

After you complete the questionnaire, you'll probably be brought up to date on the latest goings-on at the bulletin board. Other information will appear on the screen about the rules of the BBS, costs (if any) and limitations. You'll probably be anxious to move on, but take a moment to read whatever is put before you—it could be important.

Following the messages, you'll most likely be sent to the Main Board or Main Menu. This is the directory from which you can travel to all corners of the BBS.

Here you might find options such as Download a File, Locate a File by Name, Bulletin Listings, Chat With Others, Join a Conference, etc. Again, each BBS might look a little different, so our instructions might not ring true on all BBSs. In these cases, it's best to just feel your way and experiment.

Getting the Goods — Once you've found something of interest, like File Directory, try entering the letter(s) appearing in upper case before File

Directory in the Main Menu. In this case it's "F".

You should now be looking at another menu, one that lists categories of files that may or may not be available to you (depending on the BBS, callers are given little, moderate or complete access on the first call; you might be asked to become a paying member—maybe \$20 to \$100 per year—in order to retrieve files and access some of the premium services of the BBS).

Try choosing a category of files that sounds inviting. Doing so will bring up a list of files held within that category, with the name of the file at the left and the description to the right. Keep striking the Enter key until you find something that catches your eye. Now type an "n" and Enter (or the required command on the BBS that ceases listing of files — try typing "?" for a list of those

commands). Now we're ready to download (copy the file onto your computer).

Downloading — Typing a "d" should present you with an inquiry about the name of the file. Enter the name exactly as it appears on the list and hit Enter. If you're asked for another file name, just hit Enter again. Follow any other instructions the BBS sends and you'll soon see the bulletin board take over (it also might ask for something called a protocol, in which case "Zmodem" should do fine; if not, try Xmodem or Ymodem — Windows Terminal users should choose Binary Transfers from the Settings menu option and then click on Xmodem).


The BBS will let you know your download is taking place, including how much time the transfer will take, the speed of the transfer, etc. Don't be concerned with these now.

When the download is completed you'll be dropped back into the File List to start again.

But What If? — Remember, anytime you find yourself at an impasse, try entering the "?" for instructions.

But to avoid the impasse altogether, the best thing to do is spend as much time as you can looking around the BBS and getting a feel for the terrain. You can't "break" anything so don't worry too much about typing the wrong thing. If the BBS doesn't understand a command it will instantly let you know.

And if all else fails, try asking the sysop for help. From the Main Menu there should be a listing with the word "sysop" in it. Sometimes all you have to do is type "c" to leave a message for the system operator. But whatever the procedure, leaving a message is usually a good way to get expert feedback. In



fact, it's a good idea to leave a message even if you don't need help. Just tell the sysop you're a newcomer and you appreciate his/her letting you look around,

If you're in a real bind and need help right away, try typing "o" for operator page — or the corresponding command from the Main Menu. This will send a signal to the sysop alerting him of a caller with a problem. If the sysop is near the BBS, response will usually be immediate. But don't take it personally if you get no response — sysops are often busy people. Leave a message instead.

Onward and Upward — Now that you're able to look around the BBS, branch out (from the Main Menu) and try things like Chat (typing in "real-time" to other callers), Messaging (leaving messages and responding to other callers), Doors (ancillary programs BBSs run to allow callers to play games with others on the BBS), Bulletins (information about the BBS), and News (the latest additions to the BBS).

Sharewhat? — Before we move on, it's probably a good idea to mention something known "shareware." Much of what you'll be downloading from BBSs will be considered shareware. These range from full-motion games to practical applications like an electronic ledger. Created by independent developers and commercial software companies, shareware is simply software you are free to try before you buy.

If you plan to keep it, send the author the requested fee (usually quite moderate) and in return you'll get support, updates and sometimes a more complete version of the program.

Similar to shareware is "freeware."
This is software sent out to bulletin
boards for callers to use at will, as long
as they don't modify and resell it.

3. Who to Call

We suggested before that you take a look at our list in the back of the magazine for BBS numbers in your area. But suppose you're interested in comparing how the different bulletin board software programs "act," or maybe someone suggested a particular BBS package as more caller-friendly than the others — some BBSs offer graphical "point-and-click" menus using something called RIP, while others take advantage of the look and feel of Windows.

Whatever the reason, the following is a sampling of support BBSs put online by the companies that produce them. Try them all and good luck — you're now a BBSer.



The Net on 50 Cents a Day

Traveling on the Internet's World Wide Web, in case you hadn't noticed, is very much a virtual experience. When you click on a Web hyperlink to a site in Paris, for instance, you don't touch down at Orly in a supersonic jet. Nor do you feel the rush of data crossing a transatlantic trunk line as you connect your mind and being to the Conservatoire National des Arts et Metiers (http://www.cnam.fr/).


Yes, the Internet is a form of global village, but you can leave behind your passport and visa. There are no borders to cross. Rather, using the Web is full of mundane fetching and loading of text and images. So it's refreshing when you stumble across a site that brings home the fact that you're plugged into a transcontinental network full of odd bits of culture.

Cyberville, located at

http://king.ncb.gov.sg/cyber/intro.html, is such a place. Set in saucy Singapore, the site makes an honest attempt to fit the galaxy of the Web into a real-world frame. There's shopping at the mall, a newsstand to peruse for the morning paper, and next door is a cafe at which to grab a cup of joe. There's also a medical center, an arcade, a library, a convention center, bank and stock market for the pin-stripe types, and a movie theater and museum for evening and weekend entertainment.



Yeah, you might say that Cyberville takes the "global village" metaphor just a little too seriously. Still, there are worse ways to catalog the Web, and the site uses tiny images to illustrate it, a point that cannot be made too heavy handedly in these dripping-with-GIF days.

The major downside I found was the number of links that were broken. The problem with the Web is that it is still a wholly volunteer effort (for the most part), and volunteers don't tend to spend every minute of every day policing their sites for broken or malfunctioning links.

That's why I was pleasantly surprised by the approach of Robert Forsman Jr., a researcher at the Center for Computer Vision & Visualization in Gainesville, FL. Forsman maintains the Games & Recreation "shelf" of the WWW Virtual Library —a distributed index with branches in Finland, France, and the United Kingdom (among others), seamlessly connected into one really massive collection of hyperlinks. One of the things that Forsman does is place small GIFs next to links that are temporarily down ("Pavement Ends") or seemingly down for good ("Road Out"). His site is at

http://www.cis.ufl.edu:80/~thoth/library/recreation.html.

Continuing our whirl around the globe, I find it ironic that one of the best Web pages dealing with gay Paris is in Southern California

(http://meteora.ucsd.edu:80/~norman/paris/). But then, this is just another example of the distributed nature of the Net. Anyone considering a trip to the City of Lights will be happy to find information here about museums, maps of the metro, sights, you name it. And many of the links do take you into international waters.

If jolly old England is more your thing, your guide to London is only a click away, at http://web.cs.city.ac.uk/london/guide.html. A clearinghouse on



Japan is at http://www.ntt.jp/SQUARE/www-in-JP.html. And be ready to install that Cyrillic font, because the Window to Russia site (http://www.kiae.su/www/wtr/) has an interactive English to Russian dictionary, as well as links to the wonderful St. Petersburg Web (http://www.spb.su/).

Coming back in a little closer to the US, the Great White North of Canada has some tasty treats. A travelogue of beautiful Vancouver can be found at

http://www.Direct.CA:80/Village/, and a number of links to world government sites hooking up across the globe are available at http://debra.dgbt.doc.ca/opengov/world.html. Go to the bottom of the page and click "The World" for a map of known





governments online.

If all of this travel has made you a mite peckish, motor over to the Lobster Direct home page at http://dorian.csi.nb.ca/~damber/lobster/. For those in search of incendiary delights, sauces with names like 911, Last Rites and Nuclear Hell can be found at the Hot Hot Shop (http://www.hot.presence.com/g/p/H3/). Put out that fire with a little coffee: The MotherCity Espresso site (http://www.halcyon.com/zipgun/mothercity/mothercity.html) can tell you where to go, at least when you're at the trendy coffee capital of Seattle. Hey, it's a short trip from Vancouver (and an even shorter one via hyperlink). Vegetarians will find



first celebrity guest to use the service, in a live conference on Feb. 2. Christian Slater and Sally Field followed, on Feb. 9 and Feb. 27, respectively.

CompuServe subscribers can access People Online by typing GO PEOPLE.

In a move anticipated by many in the graphics community, CompuServe says it will offer its resources to develop "a follow-on specification" to the GIF graphics format specification. The new specification, called GIF24, will "offer significant enhancements and be free and open," the company said.

This comes on the heels of The Great GIF Controversy. You've heard the story by now: GIF, or Graphics Interchange Format, is based on a compression algorithm called LZW. CompuServe, believing LZW to be in the public domain, began offering GIF as a standard in 1987. Life was great, everyone loved the file format, developers embraced it, hundreds of software products were released with everyone assuming the GIF format was in the public domain.

Not so fast.

Blue Bell, PA-based Unisys informed CompuServe in June of last year that it claimed patent rights on LZW, and CompuServe chose not to challenge the claim, which resulted in an agreement giving CompuServe a sub-license on LZW.

Tim Oren, VP of future technology, posted a message in CompuServe's Graphics Support Forum saying that CompuServe would coordinate the new

GIF24 format. GIF24 is specified to be capable of 24-bit lossless compression. Oren went on to say that CompuServe was committed to keeping GIF24 an "open" specification available at no cost.

"The new specification will be developed in cooperation with the graphics community and will include a review of relevant technology and intellectual property issues," Oren said. Email users can send questions and input on the new specification to GIF24@cis.compuserve.com.

Prodigy and the Web: How'd they do that?

Prodigy continues to lead the pack with its WWW offering (now with 12,000 a day signing up) and feed off the rumors of a new Interface, code-named "P2" (check next issue for details on the P2).

The key to being able to offer Web access to a subscriber base as large as Prodigy's is a concept they call "disk staging." Disk staging is a process where Web pages and images are stored to users' local hard disk drives so that subsequent access is almost instant. The "stage" is configurable by the user. You can choose how many pages to store, when to check them for revisions (against the live Internet site) and the refresh interval at which to refresh them. Prodigy's latest version of Web browser includes some minor bug fixes and performance enhancements to the "stage" file.

Outside of all these Web developments, Prodigy has also been tending to its core service with addition of UPS access.

Until someone figures out how to email packages, the services of companies like UPS (United Parcel Service) will remain in high demand. And now with UPS's new Air Services Menu on Prodigy users can request a pickup, order supplies, email the company, or get the latest version of the tracking software. Members are treated to special deals from the Prodigy/UPS section, too. And, of course, Prodigy members can order the UPS Air Starter Kit for everything necessary to get an account going. Jump UPS for more information.

ExpressNet offers a broad array of card member and travel services. 
family member AMEX cards for 30 bucks a clip? (!) All and all it was pretty pleasant and simple. Maybe too simple.

I also stumbled onto AOL's latest alliance, this one with Preview Media. The result is the new Preview Vacations section on the service (Keyword VACATIONS). Preview Vacations Online is just what you would expect from an online travel service, but with an interesting twist: The Travel Auction House.

The Travel Auction House is a "sealed bid" auction in which AOL members can compete to purchase brand-name vacation packages to such popular destinations as Hawaii and Mexico. With no minimum bids required, members will have the opportunity to purchase the packages at significant savings. New action items are posted every week, which members can preview before making their bids online.

AOL has taken a minority stake in Preview Media Inc. to help the company launch the venture.

In other AOL news, the service recently passed the 2,000,000 subscriber mark.

EFF sponsors suit for freedom of encryption

he Electronic Frontier Foundation is sponsoring a federal lawsuit aimed at barring the government from restricting publication of cryptographic documents and software. EFF's intention with the suit is to expand the growth and spread of privacy and security technologies, based on the argument that current export-control laws—both on their face and as applied to users of cryptographic materials—are unconstitutional.

Cryptography, defined as "the science and study of secret writing," concerns the ways in which communications and data can be encoded to prevent disclosure of their contents through eavesdropping or message interception. Although the science of cryptography is very old, the desktop-computer revolution has made it possible for cryptographic techniques to become widely used and accessible to non-experts.

EFF believes that cryptography is central to the preservation of privacy and security in an increasingly computerized and networked world. Many of the privacy and security violations alleged in the now-famous Kevin Mitnick case, such as the theft of credit card numbers, the reading of other people's electronic mail, and the hijacking of other people's computer accounts, could have been prevented by widespread deployment of this technology.

The U.S. government has opposed such deployment, fearing that its citizens will be private and secure from the government as well as from other vandals.

The plaintiff in the suit is a graduate student in the Department of Mathematics at the University of California at Berkeley named Daniel J. Bernstein. Bernstein developed an encryption equation, or algorithm, and wishes to publish a mathematical paper that describes and explains it, along with a computer program that runs the algorithm.

Bernstein also wishes to discuss these items at mathematical conferences and other open, public meetings.

The problem is that the government currently treats cryptographic software as if it were a physical weapon and highly regulates its dissemination. Any individual or company who wants to export such software — or to publish on the Internet any "technical data" such as papers describing encryption software or algorithms — must first obtain a license from the State Department. Under the terms of this license, each recipi-

ent of the licensed software or information must be tracked and reported to the government. And penalties for non-compliance can be pretty stiff—10 years in jail, a million dollar criminal fine, plus civil fines.


This legal scheme effectively prevents individuals from engaging in otherwise legal communications about encryption.

The lawsuit challenges the export-control scheme as an "impermissible prior restraint on speech, in violation of the First Amendment." Software and its associated documentation, the plaintiff contends, are published, not manufactured; they are Constitutionally protected works of human-to-human communication, like a movie, a book, or a telephone conversation. These communications cannot be suppressed by the government except under very narrow conditions—conditions that are not met by the vague and overbroad export-control laws.

In denying people the right to publish such information freely, these laws, regulations, and procedures unconstitutionally abridge the right to speak, to publish, to associate with others, and to engage in academic inquiry and study. They also have the effect of restricting the availability of a means for individuals to protect their privacy, which is also a Constitutionally protected interest.

More specifically, the current export control process:

- allows bureaucrats to restrict publication without ever going to court;
- provides too few procedural safeguards for First Amendment rights;



- requires publishers to register with the government, creating in effect a "licensed press";
- disallows general publication by requiring recipients to be individually identified;
- is sufficiently vague that ordinary people cannot know what conduct is allowed and what conduct is prohibited;
- is overbroad because it prohibits conduct that is clearly protected (such as speaking to foreigners within the United States);
- is applied overbroadly, by prohibiting export of software that contains no cryptography, on the theory that cryptography could be added to it later;
- egregiously violates the First Amendment by prohibiting private speech on cryptography because the government wishes its own opinions on cryptography to guide the public instead; and,
- exceeds the authority granted by Congress in the export control laws in many ways, as well as exceeding the authority granted by the Constitution.

If this suit is successful in its challenge of the export-control laws, it will clear the way for cryptographic software to be treated like any other kind of software. This will allow companies such as Microsoft, Apple, IBM, and Sun to build high-quality security and privacy protection into their operating systems. It will also allow computer and network users, including those who use the Internet, much more freedom to build and exchange their own solutions to these problems, such as the freely available PGP encryption program. And it will enable the next generation of Internet protocols to come with built-in cryptographic security and privacy, replacing a sagging part of today's Internet infrastructure.

The case, filed in Federal District Court for the Northern District of California, will likely take several years.

If the past is any guide, the government will use every trick and every procedural delaying tactic available to avoid having a court look at the real issues. Nevertheless, EFF remains committed to this long term project.

Full text of the lawsuit and other paperwork filed in the case is available from the EFF's online archives. The exhibits which contain cryptographic information are not available online, because making them publicly available on the Internet and BBSs could be considered an illegal export until the law is struck down. The non-cryptographic exhibits and other documents including the complaint, as well as a series of letters between Bernstein and various government people regarding crypto export are available at:

Cohassett, Massachusetts' South Shore Secrets, in its eleventh year of operation, is proudly operated by five dedicated sysops - each of whom maintain different facets of the operation. To the user, Secrets is a family of adult members that get to know each other not only on an individual basis but also as a group though nightly group chats and monthly par ties at various establishments in the Boston area.

Sysop Paul Crimmins told me SSS began with nothing but a motherboard fastened to a piece of plywood with an 80MB hard drive attached to it. Over the years, with help from members who have made contributions and donated hardware, they have built SSS into a state-of-the-art online system.

The ratio of users is 75 percent male and 25 percent female. The female members help out by chatting with other members, making Secrets the unique BBS that it is. And they are steadily increasing their female membership by allowing 30 days of

free access to women users so they can come online and see for themselves that Secrets is a safe place to play and have fun.

There's no pressure from other members here and confidentiality is one of the top priorities. They also have a private "Female Only" area where women can chat with other women about female concerns, health issues, whatever.

SSS is operated for the entertainment of its members and all members have a say in what direction Secrets goes in and how the donated money is spent.

They also have various people in the professional and medical field that give advice, try to help people get jobs or help them through life's trials and tribulations.

SSS is run using OraComm software for OS/2. Paul said the reason for the OS/2 choice is that "it has all the features you can get in a BBS software package and the cost is far cheaper than the others. OraComm OS/2 does not charge for added features like the rest," he said. "You can support up to a 100 lines on one CPU. In any case it is not the software a system runs, but the sysops and membership that make a great BBS. This OS/2 version is rock solid and the support is far superior to anything we have ever experienced. The programmers show up on site and service us! OraComm OS/2 is not to be confused with OraComm for DOS. These are two separate companies and have nothing to do with each

other."

SSS is proud of its own network called Mary Net, named after sysop Mary Higgins who came up with the idea of getting other BBSs to link with SSS and create a nationwide network of users. In early 1994, Mary Net was linked with 26 other OraComm boards that carried a combined membership of around 8,000 users nationwide. One of the most exciting features is the weekly group chat sessions when all the boards link together at the same time and meet in the chat areas, exchanging experiences, stories and just chatting about anything they want. File exchanges and email exchanges take place daily, which makes the transfer of information virtually endless.

SSS is an enlightened adult BBS not specifically catering to any one calling pool. With over 200 sigs and network areas, there is a place for everyone. SSS tries to cater to its members' needs and if there's a topic that needs discussing, then a new sig is added for that topic. Most importantly they want their members to be happy and have fun without any bashing going on.

Most of the files featured at SSS are adult in nature, but they also have an extensive file area for computer utilities and programs so the members can be up and running and enjoying what they have to offer. SSS has 24-hour technical support in the event new users get stuck or need help in using the software running on OS/2 Warp.

According to Paul, SSS will strive to maintain a BBS that is without censorship and sysop intervention. They will continue to be a place where the members can be free to be themselves without fear of ridicule or rejection.

When I asked sysop Neal Roberts to tell me about his BBS, he said they started as a support BBS for a local users group that he and his girlfriend were associated with in 1992. Unfortunately, they quickly found that the users didn't want to help support the system, so to meet expenses, the BBS became a subscription system to make ends met.

They tried all sorts of things to generate interest and income. Files and lots of mail have proven to be best. The addition of Planet Connect (satellite delivery) has been a great help with new files and over 15,000 messages daily.

When Internet access became available for a reasonable cost, they jumped on and never looked back.

Neal also told me he surely doesn't run his BBS for profit — it's more like an addiction. He said he just loves doing it.

Neal told me that he chose the software he did because after expressing an interest in setting up a BBS, a friend brought over a Wildcat! test-drive. He found it so easy to use that he upgraded to the commercial version, Wildcat! 3.01S. Even after looking at a number of other BBS packages, Neal said he never found one he likes as much as Wildcat!until maybe now. "We are taking a big step," Neal told me, "by changing to the new Major BBS 'Worldgroup' software with the intention of trying to capture a local interest in the Internet."

Neal continued to say that "with The Major BBS and eight lines, we feel that it will be a great success."

Between six CDROMs and the hard drive, they have about 40,000 files, so users can download plenty and always find something new. There are 27 Doors available for users to play. These include The Legend of the Red Dragon, The Pit. and the most popular, King of the Board.

The Bulletin menu showed over 20 bulletins, including ones regarding the use of the system, and also plenty of Door game score boards.

There are over 600 conferences you can join and participate in. The Squirrel's Nest carries Wildnet. Fidonet, and the K12 Freeway mail network, making for a varied range of

Neal said that his BBS does not cater to any particular calling populous, and that "every time I think we are getting a specific group, everything changes. First it's file hounds. then Door players or users hungry for

Neal says the Internet has definitely changed things with BBSs, that people are starting to realize what email is and that more and more BBS users are getting into the message bases.

Neal also told me he thinks that with so many people buying new computers (complete with modems), the BBS will give many newcomers to the world of telecommunications their first online experience.

Neal's occupation has nothing to do with computers, but his BBS hobby has become a way of life.

"Sometimes I think that I must be nuts" Neal exclaimed. "However the people that I have met and the satisfaction I get from running a popular bulletin board system makes it all worthwhile."

Straight Board BBS was started in Great Lakes, Illinois, running GT Power BBS software. Then around June of 1991, sysop Ray Sulich outgrew GT Power and purchased his first version of PCBoard. After converting the hoard over, he packed it up and moved (as the Navy makes you do once and a while) to Virginia Beach in 1993.

Ray told me that he started a BBS to give callers what he thought would be the perfect board: Doors, files and message bases all wrapped up in one easy-to-use package.

Straight Board BBS has 547 file areas listed, with topics running the gamut from A to Z. There are approximately 46,000 files available for download between the CDs and the hard drives.

On my visit, there were over 40 bulletins listed with varying topics (most concern the BBS itself); over 50 registered Door games (running through DoorBill); and online e-zines (electronic magazines).

Ray says the system averages about 100 callers a day, many of whom dial in to follow some of the 1.300 email conferences (which give this BBS a total of about 500,000 messages available for reading at any New Kensington

Along with Internet email and newsgroups, they also carry other popular networks like Rime, Fido, Ilink, and others.

"I love PCBoard's open structure, Ray said when asked why he ran the software. "That, coupled with the PCBoard Programming Language has allowed me to customize the software so that it's very easy to navigate, and is quite pleasing to the eye. I also have grown to enjoy the high quality of Clark Development's technical support. I can't seem to exhaust the seemingly endless resources and possibilities the software presents. The supplied utilities are top notch, and third-party support is great. It also has UUCP and Fido mail services that come with the package. I use QFront for my Fido mail front-end,

Upload Processor for my upload virus scanner, and DW_TIC as our Fido file processor."

Straight Board carries plenty of Door games as well, including Lord Usurper, BRE (InterBBS), Tradewars, Global War, The PIT, OOII, King of the Board, Sunrise Trivia, Links Golf, Food Fight and Card Sharks Deluxe.

In the very near future Ray wants to add at least four more nodes, as well as a direct connection to the Internet.

Ray has some interesting things to say about the future of BBSing and the industry's reputation. "I think that we have to watch the

image that BBSs are putting out to the general public," he said. "Everywhere we look we see the "scandals" concerning pirated software and pornographic material. We as sysops need to improve this image by providing systems that we wouldn't be afraid to have our own children call. If we decide to provide 'adult' material for our callers, it is up to us to be 100 percent sure that only adults have access to that material. I personally can't be 100 percent sure, so I don't provide it.

"On the issue of pirating software, I am a shareware author myself, so it goes without saying that I don't allow that sort of thing to go on here, and I really look down on those that do allow it. I feel that a BBS is a place where you should be able to take your entire family for enjoyment and relaxation. We try to provide that sort of service here at a price that all can insbu afford (free)."

The KloneZone supports Apple II, Macintosh, Newton and Power Macintosh, as well as MS-DOS, OS/2, Unix, and other computer platforms. The system is up 23 hours a day (down one hour for Fidonet mail processing), and supports up to 28.8 Kbps. An interesting aspect of KloneZone is that it runs on an 8MB Power Mac 8100/80 (something few of us sysops can afford).

Sysop Dan O'Leary told me about his "beta-ing" the newest version of TeleFinder, version 3.5. After hearing about its power, I had to give it whirl. My verdict? It's amazing.

Version 3.5 has both a Mac and Windows client that allow users to get an incredible graphic look and feel, and it also supports ANSI and TTY terminal programs.

But the coolest thing about the new version of the host software is that sysops can customize each section of the board with their own graphics, sounds and icons. Again, really cool.

Let me try to relive this for you. When you first call the KloneZone, you

get the screen shown in Figure 1, along with the sound of Darth Vader asking, "What is thy bidding, oh master."

Dan has created different icons for each of his conference areas (message forums) and file libraries. KloneZone carries 1.4 gigabytes of some of the latest Macintosh public domain/shareware files, a 240MB hard drive for messages, and dual 200+ MB hard disks for user-submitted uploads and additional message areas.

If you click on the "Sight&Video" icon/eyeball, you get the screen shown in Figure 2. As you can see, Dan is into some creative uses of the Mandelbrot series. Note the message areas FILM, TV, VIDEO, etc. These are some of the Fidonet echoes that KloneZone carries. The home-grown message areas are in both uppercase and lower — one of the ways you can tell when a sysop has mixed in local message areas with the worldwide Fidonet echoes.

Another nice area of his board is the "Computers" section (Figure 3), where almost all the different platforms are covered. And as you enter each of these, you're addressed by the uniquely assigned sound associated with it (I love those sounds).

I asked Dan about the integrated sounds and graphics. He said that the new TeleFinder allows each sysop to create his or her own "preference" file,

with the graphic and sound layouts embedded in the document. This allows the caller to use the same client software, and just switch between preference files for the custom look and feel of each different board they get on.

It's similar to the "configuration" file NovaLink Pro and First Class use, but an easier way to think of it is as a connection file like the CTB tools on your Mac.

KloneZone is an excellent BBS run by a confirmed Mac fanatic. It can be reached at 817.367.2712 or through its Fidonet address 1:130/1015.

Spider Island Software should be congratulated for the excellent work it has done to continually improve upon TeleFinder, coming a long way in the last few years. To bear witness to that, try some of these other TeleFinder boards:

THE CANDYSTORE BBS

A free BBS with no upload or download ratios, CandyStore supports up to 28.8Kbps and runs off a Quadra 840av

with 24MB of RAM, System 7.5, two CD-ROM drives (one networked from a Performa 550), and three hard disks (700MB, 1.2GB and a 500MB). The sysop, Angelheart, networks into the board from a Performa 475.



From the main desktop (Figure 4), you can see that the board has lots of things for people to do. An example of what's available in the Files Area can be seen in Figure 5.

I like the sysop's straightforward attitude. He even has a "Sysop's S**t List" section for those users who abuse the board—beware.

As with most GUI packages, the look you get is strongly dependent upon the version of host software the sysop is running. The more current the host software, the better your chance for custom graphics, sounds, Internet connectivity, etc.

If you're a Mac sysop, take a break one weekend, call some Mac boards and see what's out there. With all the advances just in the past year, chances are, you'll be astounded.

Pros and Cons of ISDN

On the one hand it's expensive.
On the other — it's expensive.

SDN (Integrated Systems Data Network) has been touted as the medium which will ultimately bring advanced technology into the home. It is supposed to be able to carry phone, cable television, music, and data communications — in short, most communications technologies. When I first heard of ISDN several years ago, I, too, thought it sounded like a good idea. After all, if we could bring all these things into our homes on one line, just imagine the benefits. But...

First, the good news

For example, consider a computer like the one I'm using now. It has a fax-modem attached, so obviously it can send and receive fax and data transmissions. Now, how about adding voice telephone capabilities, including both live conversation and voice-mail capabilities? While we're at it, we can hook up cable television and radio channels. Oh yeah, let's not forget high-speed data transmission, so that we can have real-time Internet access. This is ISDN.

Sound like a good idea? Well, apparently a lot of companies thought so, as several over the past few years have developed plans to get involved in ISDN.

Two years ago, ISDN was reserved for the elite few, mainly geared toward connecting corporations located within a limited geographic area. Today, ISDN connections for data transmission are being installed in homes across America. It's fast, it's reliable, and it's supported by a wide range of Internet providers. But if you're already pulling out the Yellow Pages and looking for a local ISDN connection, better have a seat.

The bad news

The difficulty in getting ISDN in your home can range from a simple phone call to months of aggravating problems, or, as in some cases, no possibility of connectivity at all. Here are some big things to look out for:

LOCATION ISDN is not available everywhere. Certainly if you live in Backwater, USA, your chances of ISDN are slim. But what about the major cities? Most big ones have ISDN somewhere in their vicinity, usually downtown where companies with big bucks can pay for it. And be careful about how your provider connects you to its ISDN trunk. At the time of this writing, Bell Atlantic of Pennsylvania (my local telephone

What it costs Alternatives company) only provides commercial connections. So, if you live in an area serviced by ISDN and if you install a business line into your house, then and only then can you get ISDN.

been through this game before. New technologies come out, no one seems to know how to handle it, and consumers are left out in the cold.

I can usually figure these things out, but this time I'm as confused about this as everyone else. I'd like to know how much it's really going to cost me to get this installed. If I estimate \$1,000 plus \$50 a month, it'll probably be \$1,500 and \$75per month. Or I'll probably buy the wrong equipment because I don't really know what I'm doing.

One thing I do know for sure: I'm not going to recommend ISDN to anyone at this time — at least not to anyone without a PhD in technical studies. And if I do, it will be after they sign an affidavit stating that I warned against it and won't be held responsible.

Location isn't the only thing affecting cost. I recently (Dec. '94) researched what it would cost to connect my home PC to an Internet service provider via ISDN. The two companies I used were Bell Atlantic—PA and Performance Systems, Inc. (PSI). Here's what I found.

the per-minute charge for a businessline call. The five-cents-per-minute ISDN charge is for local calls only, so if you aren't close to your Internet service provider, it's going to get expensive. I suppose if I really wanted ISDN, I'd save enough money to put up the \$800 start-up costs. But I know I use my modem at least 25 hours each month and 50 hours doesn't seem like a long shot. So for having ISDN for one year, I'll have paid out over \$3,000—something that I just don't want to do.

COST II As is all too often the case, the cost of cutting-edge technology is outside the reach of most individuals. In this case, cost is directly tied into your location. As mentioned before, Bell Atlantic-PA charges business rates for an ISDN connection. Do you live in Connecticut? Then you can get ISDN for about \$40 per month in off-peak hours, with unlimited usage. I'm being intentionally vague here, because the rules are different everywhere, and they change constantly. For instance, Bell Atlantic will probably propose to offer the same flat-rate off-peak monthly cost as found elsewhere, but this service won't be ready for at least six months.

Modems are the current staple of data communications, and for now they'll be my main choice. The real driving force for me (as with most people) is cost. While I'd love an ISDN connection, I certainly don't have the thousands of dollars needed to fund such a venture. For \$100 plus about \$20 per month I can get a decent Internet connection that will let me do all I need. So please, ISDN providers, don't bother me with ISDN until you get it right.

Commodore Connections

The Hard Facts on Hardware

Better relationship with your Commodore may be a chip away



ver the years the hardware scene for Commodore users has significantly changed the way we communicate with one another. In the beginning, we were using 300 baud modems manufactured to connect directly to the C64's user port — 12 years later I'm using an off-the-shelf 14.4K device without a hassle.

Following is a look at some of the hardware meant to enhance your BBSing experience, not to mention the unique experience we all encounter with the Commodore.

In the fast lane

First let's get the technobabble out of the way. To modem in the fast lane (above 2400 baud for 64 users, 9600 for 128 users), a special type of device is needed between the 64/128 and modem. More than a modem interface, ACIA/UART devices "drive" the modem and control the I/O functions between the computer and modem—they connect to the cartridge port of the Commodore.

There are two such devices on the market, the SwiftLink and the HART. The SwiftLink uses the 6551 ACIA (Asynchronous Communication Interface Adapter) chip. The HART uses the National Semiconductor NS8250A UART (Universal Asynchronous Receiver/Transmitter) chip. In case you were wondering, "HART" stands for HARTRONICS Asynchronous Receiver/Transmitter.

What are the speed limits on the modem fast lane? The SwiftLink allows up to 38.4K bps; the HART cart permits 57.6K bps. These devices require terminal software programmed to recognize them, such as Novaterm 9.5, Fritzterm, Kermit v2.2, Terminal One,

Desterm or Dialogue 128.

I've not handled a HART device, but the SwiftLink comes with a DB-9 connector on one end and the standard cartridge port connector on the other. A small switch on the front of the cartridge allows you to switch between NMI and IRQ modes, depending on the requirements of the terminal software. A standard DB-9 to DB-25 cable is required to connect an external modem to the computer.

RAM and disk storage

Another major change over the years has come in the form of storage devices used with Commodores. Twelve years ago Datasettes were used to load and save programs. Today I regularly download files directly to a RAM device which allows me up to 16 megabytes of disk storage in a semi-permanent (ie, battery backed) form. High capacity RAM and disk drives are quite useful for both BBS callers and sysops wanting fast access to more files online. They also improve the overall operation with faster loading BBS modules. RAM devices are nice because everything is written to or read from the chip. There are no mechanical parts to slow things down or wear out. And access time for reading or writing to RAM is much faster than when writing to a physical disk drive.

RAM Expansion Units (REUs) are

known as temporary storage devices, since as soon as the computer is turned off whatever was stored in the RAM memory is lost. A device called BBU (for Battery Backup Unit), sold by Performance Peripherals Inc., allows data stored in the REU to be maintained when the computer is off. Usually data stored in here is copied to an actual disk drive for permanent storage.

Commodore brand REU's can be found without too much trouble in the used market; the 512K 1750 Clone manufactured by Chip Level Designs is available through Software Support International.

There is one drawback, however. Though the Commodore brand REUs can be upgraded to two megabytes, due to the compact design of the 1750 Clone, these cannot be upgraded beyond their original 512K capacity.

Semi-permanent RAM devices continue to hold data and programs within RAM, as they have a power supply separate from the computer. RAMLink and RAMDrive are two such devices. (RAMDrive has an internal backup battery, while the RAMLink uses an external one.)

RAMLink is available with various amounts of memory using one and/or four megabyte SIMM chips. It can hold from one to 16MB, depending on the arrangement of SIMMs. It also comes with an REU port so the memory from an REU may be utilized. A pass-through port is available as well, so an additional cartridge can be added.

RAMDrive is more compact, with its battery built in, and it can easily be moved from one computer to another. RAMDrive comes in three memory configurations: 512K, one megabyte or two megabyte. The one megabyte unit can be upgraded to two megabytes, but the 512K unit cannot be upgraded.

The 1541 disk drive is a venerable old friend (one I wouldn't be without), but I depend on other disk drives for my day-to-day use. For instance, there are disk drives for the Commodore using 3.5 disks and offering greater storage and improved speeds over the 1541 (or 1571) disk drive.

Commodore's 1581 drive gives 3,160 free disk blocks, or about 800K using DD (double density) 3.5 inch disks.

Within the last few years, Creative

Micro Designs Inc. (CMD) began marketing a newer 3.5-inch disk drive which offers compatibility with the 1581 — with a few enhancements. The FD series drives come in two types: the FD-2000 and the FD-4000. The 2000 unit uses DD disks or high density disks that give 6,336 free blocks — the equivalent of 1.6 megabytes.

The 4000 unit uses the same two disk formats and utilizes Enhanced Density disks to give (are you ready for this) 12,736 blocks or 3.2 megabytes of disk space. This is the largest storage capacity of any floppy drive available on the market, irrespective of platform.

CMD also markets HD series hard drives for the Commodore, available from 20MB to a gigabyte or more of storage space. The price may seem stiff (\$299.95 for a 20MB HD series hard drive), but they use SCSI technology and come complete with their own power supply, controller card and a sturdy metal case. The drives can be used on other platforms, too, allowing further use and compatibility. Other Commodore platform hard drives, such as the Lt. Kernal, ICT or DataChief, are no longer pushed but may be found on the used market.

The FDxx, HD series hard drives, RAMLink and RAMDrive devices all function similarly in terms of disk usage. Each will emulate common Commodore disk drive types, such as the 1541, 1571, and 1581, using "emulation partitions." Another kind of partition known as "Native Mode" can also be used. Native partitions can be up to 16MB for the CMD RAMLink and HD series devices, or up to disk or RAM capacity for the FDxx drives or for PPI's RAMDrive. Native partitions, in case you were wondering, are used in a manner very similar to the MS-DOS structure, allowing nested subdirectories.

Fast load cartridges can help speed up older disk drives. And most of those carts have features that enhance the Commodore in other ways, with such things as easier disk commands, program capturing (for making archival backups of copy protected software) and graphics printing.

JiffyDOS, another CMD product, enhances the overall operation and speed of the disk drives by replacing the standard DOS chips in Commodore (and other compatible disk drives) and the Kernal ROM in the computer itself. Aside from enhanced disk drive speeds for loading, saving and reading files, it gives new, easier DOS commands and utilizes the F-Keys for some of its most activated features. Commands for loading files are as easy as typing ^ (up arrow) and the filename. All CMD disk drives have JiffyDOS included as part of the drive itself. RAMLink has the kernal ROM built into it for both the 64 and 128 computers.

There's a bit of pro and con involved as to whether or not one really needs new Commodore hardware. For many, the stock devices will suit them fine. Others want or need to be power users with all the hardware to match. It's really a matter of personal preference and perspective. I'd not want to return to the 300 baud and Datasette days, but it's nice to have a range of choices available.

et you didn't know there is a Hall of
Fame for freeware. "The Freeware Hall of
Fame" list, otherwise known as HOF, was

a sorted index to free programs and databases commonly found on public access bulletin boards around the world. The programs
on this list have been tested and found to
work as described, and to be worth downloading."





Mr. Barry's list is limited to freeware, or programs that require no fee for individual use. However, being freeware alone doesn't necessarily guarantee a spot on the list. It must also be a well written program that performs as promised.

Don't look for any games in the HOF; they're not there. What you will find are some of the finest utilities and applications available. Many are tools you couldn't find elsewhere at any price. And all are free for you to use and pass along to friends.

Following is a sampling (with my reviews) of some of the programs you'll find on the "Hall of Fame" list:

HyperCD version 4.0

HYPCD40.ZIP

by HyperDyne 2000 Software

This is not just another Windows audio CD player for your CDROM drive. What makes this one different is the size.

When you run the program from your desktop, it creates a little window about 2 inches square in the lower right corner of the screen. All the controls you need are within that small space. It has a volume slide control and everything else you could want—even an eject button.

Bottom line: HyperCD is small, simple to use, and always out of the way. Get rid of your bulky CD player and replace it with HyperCD.

PICEM ver 3.2

PICEM32.ZIP by John Bridges

PICEM is a graphic file viewer that will not only display .PIC, .PCX, .GIF, and .TGA files, but will also let you adjust contrast and brightness, and then save changes to disk.

Although there are several command-line parameters you can use, the simplest way to operate PICEM is to just run it in a directory containing the graphics you want to view. A list of available files will be shown, from which you simply pick the ones you want by tagging the files with the space bar. When the image is displayed, adjust the brightness and contrast with the INS/DEL and the (+) and (-) keys.

As I mentioned above, you can the save the altered file to disk in any of the formats. This makes it an excellent choice for converting graphics between formats.

Another way to use it is by way of the command line. Just type PICEM FILENAME (wild cards are accepted).

There's a lot of power packed into this little file. Place it somewhere in your path and you'll always have a fast an easy graphic file viewer at hand.

CLONE ver 2.10

CLONE210.ZIP by Eric Tauck

CLONE is a quick and clean singlepass disk copier. It comes equipped with several options, such as formatting the target disk when needed, setting the number of copies to be made, serial numbers and more. These options can be used at the command line or stored in the environment with a SET statement in your AUTOEXEC.BAT file.

There are no fancy menus like those found in other shareware disk copiers, but CLONE is a keeper that you'll want to add to your toolbox.

HDInfo Release #7

HD0794R7.ZIP by Ray Martin

This is the definitive collection of hard drive data. It has all the information you could possibly want on over 3,400 hard drives, from the early five-meg MFM drives right up to the 2.7-gigabyte SCSI drives.

The list is sorted alphabetically by manufacturer, disk controller type, and then by model number. Just scroll through the list until you locate your hard drive. Next you're given the number of heads, cylinders, sectors, size in megabytes, and so on. This information is especially important if you didn't get a manual with your hard drive.

I've used this list on several occasions, as I'm sure you will too if you do any work on your drives. Martin is continually updating this list, so always look for the latest release.

NE ver 2.03

NE203.ZIP by GDSOFT

Here's an excellent text editor with all the features found in expensive shareware and commercial programs. The author calls it NE for "No Edlin."

Don't dismiss NE just because it's freeware. It's really a powerful editor with lots of features, including keyboard and mouse controlled pull-down menus for many of the most used options.

For simple operations, this might be all you need. But it also has plenty of Wordstar compatible commands listed in the nine-page documentation. (I suggest you print this out and keep it handy until you get familiar with the commands you'll use the most.)

NE also has a very good hypertext help system. Just hit F1 and click on the topic you want for more information.

The one thing NE doesn't have built in is a spell checker. But it's easy to

incorporate any stand-alone checker by simply telling it what to use. There are many commercial and shareware programs fitting the bill, but since we're talking freeware, you'll want to take a look at a more than adequate spell checker by the same company...

GDSPELL ver 2.0a

GDSP20A.ZIP by GDSOFT

GDSPELL is a freeware ASCII text file spell checker. To use it, all you need to do is run the program with the name of the file you want to check. When it comes upon a word it doesn't recognize, you have the option to look up the correct spelling, edit, skip, or add to the dictionary.

GDSPELL is quite fast because it loads a 10,000-word dictionary of common words into RAM, and has an added 50,000-word dictionary on disk. It also has an auxiliary dictionary that you can build on.

Aside from being fast, GDSPELL is also easy to use, working well with any editor that allows for an add-on spell checker. It's an excellent alternative to high-priced programs.

Following are two updates of programs I have reviewed previously. Both are still useful. Both are still free.

NFX ver 1.30a

NFX130A.ZIP by Bluewave Software

NFX is about the easiest offline reader you'll find.

All you need to do is load it and select CONFIGURE from the menu.

You'll be asked where your .QWK packets are, where to put .REP files, and what editor to use. Included in the archive is TED.COM, a simple editor. But if you use something else, all you need to do is set the name and path. Now you're ready to read the mail.

After getting back to the main menu, choose SELECT QWK and a list should be displayed (if you set the paths correctly). Highlight the one you want to read and hit Enter. After your packet is uncompressed, you're given three choic-

Rusty n Edie's BBS 7393 California Ave. Youngstown, OH 44512 es: MAIL, FILES and NEWS. Choosing FILES will show a new file listing if you toggled that on in the mail Door. NEWS will display the BBS NEWS file. MAIL lists all your personal mail. When there's none to read, just move around the screen and select one of the conferences that has mail, and hit ENTER.

While you're reading mail, several options are available. These include Index, Order, Find, Mark, Save, and Reply, all of which are fairly self-explanatory.

So if you always wanted to get into your favorite BBS's messages bases, NFX will get you off to a good start. It isn't as "full-featured" as some of the others, but it'll do quite well for the beginner. You might even find it becoming all you need.

KILBAK ver 6.0

KILBAK6.ZIP by John McNamara

If you do any kind of text editing, you'll probably end up with a lot of backup files. They're those pesky *.BAK cluttering up your hard drive.

Every text editor I've seen uses this method, as do many word processors.

KILBAK scans all your drives and will delete any it finds.

If you have a CDROM or other drive that you would rather KILBAK not check, you can use the "SKIP" or "OMIT" options. The default is *.BAK, but you can also have it work on other files with any extension you specify.

This program could save you a lot of disk space—you'd be surprised how much is used up by unnecessary back-up files. Just be careful, as this program can be unforgiving.

All of the above programs are freeware. There is no fee for individual use. However, if you do find a freeware program useful, send the author a note letting him or her know.

I always preach that you should look at shareware before paying high prices for commercial programs. Ditto for freeware.

You can call the Freeware Hall of Fame BBS for hundreds of freeware (and shareware) programs. Access, of course, is free. Give them a call 804.293.4710.



Modem Discounts

Digicom's Connection 288DF

Is SoftModem Technology' for you?

he Modem Mage seldom changes the course of time, but I felt it necessary to alter events just a bit this month. I had formerly promised to dive into some performance issues, but recently received some information that might prove as enlightening as anything you've read recently.

Digicom Systems Inc. (now owned by those Sound Blaster folks, Creative Labs Inc.) recently announced their new Connection 288DF, a 28.8K internal PC data/fax modem. When it finally releases (scheduled for May 1995) it will represent Digicom's first foray into the 28.8K data arena and will be based on their proprietary "SoftModem Technology".

At first glance this modem and its technology seem appealing; however, after picking the minds of folks involved in the marketing and support of this and existing Digicom products, I have some points you should remember when considering this modem in your BBS or other online plans.

The 288DF uses a new breed of DSP (Digital Signal Processor), otherwise known as a "datapump." This architecture does away with the integrated DSP and Supervisor (controller) technology seen in other modems. The code for the modem resides not in the modem itself but instead on your local PC storage device. Hmmm... if my HD crashes my modem is brain-dead?

Notes on Table I:

Each time you bring up your telecomm software or BBS you must also load a DOS- or Windows- based driver which first loads the code to the modem. Without these drivers your modem is a bare DSP, all dressed up with no place to go.

Since this data transfer is via the ASIC and not the DTE, load time is quoted as 100 msec. Sounds familiar — I used to brag to the other mages that I could ride a rogue dragon for 100 milliseconds... never made it past 50 milliseconds! My point is, beware of performance quotes before the product even ships.

Also note that since this is an internal PC product, it is not a viable option for Amiga, Mac, or other non-PC based systems. Conceptually, this is a very slick technology. It is similar to FLASHROM-based modems such as Multitech or USRobotics in that all code can be updated via a file transfer from a BBS or online service. Supra offers FLASHROM, too, but only for its supervisor (their datapump is Rockwell-based and therefore not flash upgradable). Digicom offers free software updates via America Online.

The 288DF can be configured either as a data or fax modem, but requires front-end software to distinguish what type of call is coming in. The appropriate modem code is then loaded, enabling fax or data, allowing the modem to continue with the connection. It will also be upgradable to Voice Messaging.

Digicom also tries to play the Mage's game — foreseeing the future. They plan on selling feature updates for this modem including Caller ID and Voice View protocol. While they predict these features coming some day, I was unable to get them to point to a date on a calendar.

Some of the standard specifications of the 288DF seem a bit limiting, but perhaps the actual release will remedy them. Supported IRQs are 3,4,5,9... not the more standard 3,4,5,7. Com ports supported are 1-4.

V.34 rates supported are 28,800, 26,400, 24,000, 21,600, 19,200, and 14.400.

The ITU V.34 spec does go much lower for V.34, so this may be an oversight on somebody's part. Also missing



from fax is Class 2 or the ITU Class 2.0 standard. It does support V.17, V.29 and V.27 send and receive Group 3 Class 1 fax standards. For error correction and compression support, it offers V42 and MNP.

Of particular interest to this oldtimer will be performance at 28,800 under compressed-file, bi-directional transfers. Few tests really show modem horse-power like bi-directional transfers of the ITU-T (#.TST) standards files.

As this is new DSP technology, the performance aspects of the 288DF will be under severe scrutiny. This alone

could make or break the future of this new breed of modem.

For some, the Digicom 288 DF could be the perfect solution. I see this modem as a real contender for the lowend modem market where prices are plummeting. For the power user or sysop, this modem will not likely be the product of choice. We'll certainly find out in the months to come.

One quick note: I was pleased at the response time to Digicom's technical support voice line. While it was on my dime, the call was answered in under four minutes. The representative was

knowledgeable and tried to be as helpful as possible. He didn't even snicker at my name!

He did seem a little perplexed that their sales literature indicated the modem was available, as he was quoting a ship date in late May. Digicom offers support via their own BBS and AOL, but surprisingly lacked any Internet or CompuServe support options.

You can reach Digicom's sales department at 408.262.1277, and technical support at 408.934.1601.

Sysop/Provider programs

I've included a couple of basic charts to help those who believe a picture (well, chart) is worth a page or two of rambling text.

The minimum performance level is v.32bis (14,400 bps), but will soon be displaced by V.34. All modems also must have v.42bis for error correction and data compression to make this list. The rightmost column of Table I shows all modems faster than 14400 bps that support at least v.32bis standards.

I recommend only V.34 for sysops. End-users can economically afford to now live by the same standards. The V.34 ITU-T standard offers 50 percent more throughput than v.32bis, at only minimal cost increases. It also offers a better chance at a high-speed connect (24,000–28,800) than VFC under minimal line conditions. Beware of upgrade plans to v.FAST/v.34 modems, as various manufacturer programs vary greatly.

More than a modem

Some vendors offer more than just modems to the sysops joining their program. For example, US Robotics offers substantial discounts off their CommServer 486 LAN product. Other vendors, such as ZyXel, offer big discounts on modem rackmounts. A rackmount reduces the tangle of multiplying power supplies and becomes economical for sysops planning on larger, multiline systems.

Buyers' restrictions

If you maintain a system operating 24-hours per day for the last six months,

then you're eligible for any of these discounts. Some manufacturers only require that you are currently running a BBS at time of ordering. A few may actually waive the current operating requirement.

Once you receive your modem, you're expected to keep the BBS up and running between six and 12 months (requirements vary). Generally,

Prepared by the publishers of the book How To Successfully Run A BBS For Profit the modem is yours to do whatever you want with after this period expires. Some manufacturers may ask you to never sell modems purchased on a discount plan. Modem resellers, such as computer stores, are generally excluded from participation in discount plans.

Nearly all of the modem vendors are accepting VISA and MasterCard for orders. Some also accept a cashier's check or money-order for prepay orders. Personal checks often require additional clearing time which just holds up your order. C.O.D. is becoming less common, and is rumored for phase-out by several of the larger players over the next few months.

One requirement, which goes for nearly all vendors, is that they generally expect at least a one-line advertisement somewhere in your welcoming screens. For example: "Using the finest Model XYZ modem from Acme Modem Co." would be perfectly acceptable in all cases.

Order processing and availability

Delivery times and schedules vary radically, so your mileage may vary. Many manufacturers are placing orders on hold until they release V.34. Hayes typically shipped in 48 hours, and to the far extreme, US Robotics guarantees a two to six week waiting period.

For Canadian, European and other sysops outside the U.S., you may or may not be eligible for discount offers. Please check carefully ahead of time to avoid disappointment. You may want to check with their European subsidiaries before contacting the U.S.

Online Services Via Cable

Performance at a price

Net surfers and online service customers share a need for speed that seems almost insatiable. The cable industry thinks it may have the remedy: cable modems and lines, which can provide access to the Internet, America Online (AOL), CompuServe (CIS), and Prodigy at speeds up to 50 times faster than telephone lines.

Don't throw away your telephone-based modem just yet, however. Only a handful of cable companies are conducting online service trials in the U.S. at the moment, restricting the high-speed access to a few hundred customers (and, in many cases, cable/online access employees). Cable-based delivery services are now, or soon will be, available in Philadelphia (Comcast Cable), Massachusetts (Continental Cablevision), and San Diego (Cox Cable Communications).

These and other cable companies are studying the trials to determine the viability and potential profitability of cable-based online services, with an eye to rolling out this type of access nationwide within the next five to 10 years. The primary benefit of this kind of high-speed access is obvious—cable offers faster access and download times, therefore reducing the user's billable online time. Additionally, faster cable speeds provide a better platform for advanced online services, such as full-motion video.

Everyone that has accessed Prodigy via Comcast Cable's lines has stated that "they never want to go back," said Comcast's Mark Coblitz, vice president of strategic planning. Coblitz noted that during cable vs. telephone modem tests those using the cable network for access were well into their Prodigy sessions before the telephone modems could finish dialing. Additionally, the cable modem was able to download more than one dozen GIF-format images in the time it took the telephone modem to download just one image of the same size.

Comcast officials plan to offer more than just Prodigy service to their customers, however. Beginning later this year, Comcast Cable will begin rolling out "Comcast PC Connect"

nationwide to its customers. The service will initially be offered to approximately 300 customers in the Philadelphia suburbs. (Comcast is headquartered in Philadelphia.) The service will also be available in Baltimore, MD; West Palm Beach, FL; and southeastern Michigan before the end of 1995. Comcast plans to eventually extend the service to all of its 3.3 million subscribers nationwide.

Comcast PC Connect service, which will offer access to AOL, Prodigy, the Internet, and local information resources, will be available to Comcast Cable customers only. It will be delivered concurrently with Comcast's cable service via the company's cable lines. Each subscriber's home will be equipped with a splitter that will route the video signals to the television and PC data to the customer's computer. Additionally, subscribers will be equipped with an Intel/Hybrid Networks modem capable of receiving and sending information via cable lines.

Comcast estimates that early customers can expect speeds of about 10 megabits per second from the server to the home computer, and up to 128 kilobits per second for information being sent from the PC to the server. (The Intel/Hybrid cable modems are 50 times faster than the best telephone modems now on the market.) Future releases of the modem will offer even faster access.

Although Comcast's project has received more press than other projects, it is by no means the first cable entrant in the online service market. Continental Cablevision of Boston, along with partner Performance Systems International, introduced the first cable (Internet) access service, dubbed PSICable, in March 1994. (The service is now available in Cambridge, MA, and the surrounding areas.)


PSICable users are equipped with Zenith's HomeWorks cable television modem, which can reach speeds between 50 and 200 times faster than 9600 bps and 2400 bps telephone modems. However, the service's price could prove prohibitive to the average user; PSICable's rates begin at \$125 per month for single user access, and can reach up to \$2,750 per month for large business customers.

Cox Cable Communications is also utilizing the HomeWorks modem, this time to deliver the Prodigy service to a handful of customers in San Diego on a trial basis. Participants are now able to access Prodigy at speeds of up to 100,000 bps. Cox Cable plans to begin charging participants for the service early this year. The company will offer several different pricing plans to help determine what customers are willing to pay for cable access to Prodigy. Cable delivery of Prodigy will eventually be offered on a for-fee basis to all Cox Cable Communications customers. However, the company has not established a time table for the roll-out.

Internet Roadside Attractions: Sites sounds and scenes along the information superhighway (Ventana Press) begs the question, "Just how far can a metaphor be taken?" Pretty far, it seems.


But once you get beyond the title — and you should — you'll find a sort of picture dictionary of the Internet, organized by topic and indexed by Internet client.

The "attractions" are chosen by your guides, seven veteran Net surfers, writers and developers — Gareth Branwyn, Luke Duncan, Sean Carlton, Tom Lichty, Donald Rose, Shannon R. Turlington, and Jan Weingarten — who each provide a photo and bio so you can choose your favorites.

The book itself is a good reference. Over 500 resources are listed, including games, Web sites, gophers, chat areas, newsgroups, and WAIS databas-

es. And each site comes with anecdotal references from the contributor.

It's more fun to use than many of the bookform refer-



ences we've seen, and it comes packaged with a CD-ROM containing Ventana Mosaic (the Web browser developed for Ventana by Spyglass, Inc.) and a searchable full text of the book, including hyperlinks to online content—a nifty bonus.

Get the book for quick help cruising the Net. Or just continue thumbing a ride off the slow-poke search engines.

Net Money

by Kelly Maloni, Ben Greenman and Kristin Miller 288 pages, \$19 (US)

Rolling right along, Michael Wolff & Company and Random House Electronic Publishing have released *Net Money*, another in the successful series of handbooks based on last year's picture-filled and info-packed *Net Guide*.

Net Money (authored by Kelly Maloni, Ben Greenman and Kristin Miller) uses the same formula as the others with an alphabetical structure separated into logical chapters like Shopping, Investment, Business and Careers.

The book promises readers will learn how to file taxes online, find a job using a virtual resume, and get thousands of bucks of news and data for free.

It doesn't lie.

There are nine entries for resume and resume writing alone. Taxes: A couple dozen.

Seems everything related to Money that can be found on the Net and com-

mercial services is indexed, listed, categorized and described here. *Net Money* also explains, in writing that's simple but not condescending, how to find all of it. And BBSs get a fair shake, too, with many of the biggies expounding their virtues (or having them expounded).

Net Money is further rounded out with appendices listing sites the authors have deemed the "sleaziest" and a couple under the heading, "Calling these sites boring is an insult to boring people." Beyond that there's a register of business BBSs, software support sites, and contact information for Internet providers.

But with things changing so quickly on the boards, Net and Web, there's an inherent problem with using a paper-published book as a guide—time. Turnaround in publishing these days is still long enough that entries may no longer exist when the hard copy actually reaches readers' hands. However, a random test of *Net Money* found entries current.

Modem Love: Your Step-by-Step Guide to Sex on the Information Highway

by Rexxxxx 215 pages, \$12

Less a guide to the what and where of cybersex than a chance to become a voyeur to others' encounters, *Modem Love* (Kensington Books) serves up hot chat for readers to learn by example.


Author Rexxxxxx takes us along on his trips to the "verbal" brothels of America Online where we sit in on 10 explicit erotic encounters: "I withdraw and slowly place my **** in your ******" is a typical example.

The transcripts may be instructional to those who simply don't know the etiquette of "modem love," but they can get a bit tiresome, too, as readers are not actually privy to the episodes in real time—just the history.

And Modem Love teases readers with talk of the Internet, but really only delivers on the ins and outs of AOL.

If you're looking for titillation, call your favorite adult BBS and, uh, just do what comes naturally.
