...from the Presidents corner...

Not only did we get a //6S at our October meeting, but it was Apple themselves that presented it to us. Jim Mensch, one of the developers for the 6S brought his own 6S along, and showed us many of the new features. He even went as far as taking his 6S apart to show us how modular it is. Everything from the power supply on up just snaps out and is ready for replacement. Some of the features that the 65 has are a built in clock, 2 serial ports, and a 16 voice audio synthesizer (that means is can reproduce both musical instruments and voice that is barely distinguishable from the real thing). You can even give the synthesizer 64K worth of things to and then turnaround and do something else like read the disk, print some data, go to sleep, etc. You name it. The synthesizer produces stereo output, but the 6S only has a mono amplifier built it. You need to spend an additional \$19 for a true stereo amplifier. (That way only the people who want it will have to pay for it.)

While the 65 will run with most existing cards for you //+ or //e, one of the cards that will not run unmodified is the Disk JI interface card. Apparently it needs its timing honed a little bit. This is supposed to be a simple modification from your Apple dealer and will not affect the operation of the drive on your existing machine. (I've heard that one before!) Jim then opened up to questions from the floor and was bombarded by technical questions ranging from phantom slot cards to beta availability of "tools" for the control panel. We ended up having to end the meeting because of time with are 45 minutes of questions left. Save those thoughts and questions.

We should have another demo of the 65 at either our November o December meeting. This time it will be by one of our local dealers. One more additional note. We, DAUG, were offered the FIRST public domain software available for the 65 by Jim. Lets here it for Jim and the folks at Apple.

A special thanks to the people from FAU (Third Apple Users), and AAAC (Aurora Area Apple Club) for attending our meeting to get the attendance up so we could host Apple.

Are you still planning on winning the \$700 hard disk drive? Are you going to make sure we get more than 100 people at the November meeting? You get free tickets just for showing up at a meeting. PROPOSED AMENDMENT WILL SIMPLIFY JOB ASSIGNMENTS

At its October meeting, the Board of Directors approved an amendment that will simplify the process of filling a special function within the Board, by permitting the President to appoint any member of the Board to Committee chairmanships. The Board feels that this amendment will strengthen the operation of DAUG, without limiting the authority of the membership. Having passed the Board, the amendment must gain the approval of the membership, which will be sought at the December meeting. The full text appears below.

Proposed Amendment to DAUG By-Laws

Article Three

BOARD OF DIRECTORS AND OFFICERS. The Board of Directors of DAUG shall consist of the President, the Vice-President and nine Directors at Large.

(substitute in duties of President)

(4) appoint members of the Board to the offices of Secretary, Treasurer, Librarian, Newsletter Editor, Users Group Ambassador, and the chairmen of the Membership Committee and the Program Committee, subject to the approval of the Board.

Change titles of VP's to "Chairman, Program Committee" and "Chairman, Membership Committee"

Add paragraph:

VICE PRESIDENT. The Vice President shall perform the duties of the President, in his absence. He may also, in the discretion of the President, function in any of the offices listed above, with the exception of Secretary and Treasurer.

Revise paragraph on VP/Program's duties:

CHAIRMAN, PRUGRAM COMMITEE. The duties of the Program Chairman shall be to develop programs for the regular monthly meetings, to negotiate with potential speakers, and to make whatever arrangements are necessary for successful meetings, working within the guidelines set down by the Board of Directors.

Add paragraph:

USER GROUP AMBASSADOR. The User Group Ambassador shall be designated as the Group's official liaison with Apple Computer Inc, shall maintain contact with the various Apple bulletin boards and on-line conferences, and shall keep all appropriate officers and directors informed of matters which are pertinent to their functioning.

Blank Diskettes SPECIAL

ASCII Express Special Price!

United Software Industries, the folks who brought you ASCII Express and ASCII Express Pro, have come out with their new product for the Apple II6S.

It's called <u>MouseTalk</u> and it is downwardly compatible, meaning it will also run on the //c and enhanced //e. As its name implies, ASCII Express MouseTalk utilizes the mouse with a Mac style menu bar and pull-down menus. While a mouse is recommended, it is not required.

ASCII Express is the Number 1 communications software for the Apple // series, and this new version has many new and improved features. I saw it being demonstrated at the Apple Rollout in September and was favorably impressed.

The list price is \$150, but here's the special deal:

If you're a registered owner of AE Pro (Dos or ProDos version), you can upgrade to the new version for \$50 plus S&H. If you want to buy the new version outright, you can do so for \$65 plus S&H.

All purchases must be made through me in one combined transaction in order to get this price, and the offer is good only through the end of November. If you're interested, see me for details at the meeting, because there isn't much time.

Tapes now available

On July 19 & 20, the 1st Mid-West Users Group Conference was held in Chicago. Almost 100 people from 39 different groups from as far away as Ohio and Ontario attended the Meeting. DAUG had 3 representatives at the meeting, and Al Hilliger, Club Secretary, recorded many of the meetings.

You can borrow individual tapes for a whole month. Tapes vary in length from 20 minutes to over 1 hour. A list of subjects is available at the Librarian's Desk. I highly recommend the speech by Bruce Tognazzini. Bruce was around in the start-up period in Wozniak's garage, and has some amazing and funny anecdotes to tell. : %

Find out what FID <u>really</u> stands for, how Cap'n Crunch blew the whistle and ended up in the slammer, and why Bruce had to enter a national programming competition under an assumed name.

<u>Mac Doll's</u>

We now have Public Domain programs available on 3.5" disks for the Macintosh. We have 4 different DoM's with about 400K of useful programs on each one. That's roughly 20 programs per disk. The DoM's are priced at \$5 each.

SARGUN III review

SARGUN 111 is a computer chess program written by Dan and Kathe Sprackien and published by Hayden Software, 600 Suffolk, Lowell, MA 01854. SARGUN 111 is a double sided disk and costs around \$40. A back up copy can be made. The Spracklens have once again improved upon a previous version of their chess program. First there was SARGUN and then SARGON 11. My first experience with a chess program was with SARGON 11.

l enjoyed using SAKBUN 11 and now i am even more pleased with SARGUN 111. This new version is just as challenging an opponent as its predecessors and it retains all the features found in them. For example, play levels which are increasingly challenging, super sharp graphic display, the ability to switch between the board display and the move list, move retraction and reselection, and mate-in-two (or three) problem set up, to name a few. In addition, SARGON 111 offers the following features:

1) TERMINATE SEARCH - stop SAR6UN's search for its next move and make it play the best one found so far.

 INVERT BOARD - if you decide to switch color, you can put that color on the bottom of the screen, so as to retain your perspective.

3) OFFER SUBGESTED MOVE - let SARGON suggest your next move.

4) EASY MODE - at any play level, prevents SARGON from considering future moves while you are thinking about your next move.

5) VERIFY MODE - SARGON acts as a referee for two human players, while retaining most of its other facilities.

6) ZAP BEEPER - turn off beeper function (a toggle function).

 DRAW OFFER - SARGON will offer a draw or will let you request a draw.

8) REPLAY GAME - provides a review of the entire game currently in memory.

9) PRINT LIST OF MOVES/BUARD - will print to your printer the game's moves and/or the current board position. 1 was impressed by how easily and well this feature worked.

10) SAVE GAME TO DISK - save the current game in memory to disk.

11) LOAD GAME FROM DISK - retrieve saved game from disk.

12) GREAT GAMES - replay a game from those played by . chess masters of yore; over a hundred from which to choose. The instruction manual gives a brief description of each game.

13) CHESS PROBLEMS - instructions on checkmates and strategy.

l thoroughly enjoy playing chess against SARGON 111 and I would highly recommend it to chess players of any skill level.

A FEW GUODS LISTS

You may know that Apple maintains an extensive listing of Apple II and Macintosh end users. These lists are used when they send mailing pieces--often including promotional offerings and other timely information to Apple owners. If you would like to be included in this list, simply notify the membership chairman and he will send your name to Apple Prokofiev's Peter and the Wolf Fisher-Price Ages 3-7 \$39.95

This childrens program/game is designed to teach kids the basics of music. There are seven games combined into one program. You move around using either the joystick or the paddle. When you select a game from the picture menu, the character representated by the game will wink, smile or jump for you.

Unce you succeed in each of the games, the character will dance and sing their special tune for you. The tune matches the tune in the Peter and the Wolf classic Kussian tale. The Grandfather's game lets the you tell if the two tunes played on the fiddle are the same or different. If they are the same, you move giant box over the two smiling circle faces. If they are different, you move the box over the circle face and the triangle face. If you are correct, the faces 'grin', and happy music is played. If you were wrong, a frowning face is shown and sad music (a discord) is played.

In the Bird's game, you have to identify which of the three birds has the highest chirp, then the one with the second highest chirp, finally the one with the lowest chirp. If you are right, the sun will smile at you and reward you with a small bird picture. If you are wrong, the sun will frown, and you get the same birds so you can try again.

The Duck's game is very similar to the Bird game, only this time, the ducks quack and a little puddle with smile or frown appears. The Cat's game is similar to the 'SIMPLE-SIMUN' music/color game. You have seven cats sitting on a fence post. Some of the cats will meow a small tune and you get to duplicate the tune. This time the moon will smile or frown on your talents. After you match a tune, the next tune will be a little longer.

The Hunter's game is a matching game. Behind each door is a different 'Peter' character with his own tune. Match all the characters and they will all do a little dance for you. With the Wolf's game, you get a similar matching game, only this time you don't get to see the character, only hear his tune.

Peter's game is a little adventure. All 6 music games are hidden in the countryside. You must wander up and down ladders and throught the countryside to find hidden keys. Each key matches a color pattern for a gate. Behind each gate is one of the six games. Bump into a gate that is not open, and Peter shakes his head 'no'. Solve all of the games and Peter and his friends will perform on stage.

The animation is cute through out the games. The only thing 1 don't like about the game is that it is contained on two sides of the disk. You boot side A, then you must insert side B to continue loading. This makes it impossible for the game to be left in the machine and booted up whenever the kids want to play. (At least 1 won't let my three year old flip over the disk. Turning the power on and off is his limit.) Other than the loading, it is well worth the money.

NEW OWNERS GET HELP

AT MEETING: ASK QUESTIONS#Unce again, the New Owners Corner was of some help to a number of new Apple users (and a few not so new) who came up to the table to get some help. While no one person can have all the answers on the spot, an effort is made to refer the questioner to some member present who can help, or get the answer for later publication. Here are some of last month's questions.

We hen do you need a fan on an Apple? A: You need a fan when your Apple is generating too much heat. When you have more than three cards plugged in, especially if there is an 80 column card or a memory card, you are reaching the point when you might need a fan. If your computer is behaving erratically, especially when it occurs after your Apple has been on for a while, you may have a heat problem.

Q: 1'd like to select numbers at random, but not have duplicate selections. How can i do it? A#: There are a number of ways, but the following program, based on a suggestion from Kalph Stein, is one way of doing it.

Lines 30-50 is one way of setting up an array. The nested loop 120-140 deletes the number selected, and reduces the array by one element. To produce your own array, put its elements in line 230, and then change the value of N in line 10. Just make sure that N is less than or equal to the number of elements you have listed.

DAUG Disk of the Month # 63 - October 1986

. .

In August 1983, DAUG issued SoftGraph as DoM 25. Now it's back. with major improvements, as Enhanced ProDos SoftGraph.

What is SoftGraph? It is a program that takes raw data and produces line, bar and pie charts.

This enhanced version was developed by Tony Martin of the Stanislaus Apple Club of Modesto, CA, and introduces some improvements, which make the program much more useful.

Nost valuable of the four new features found in this version is the ability to transfer files, or sections of files, from AppleNorks spreadsheets.

Another nice feature is that you can make a hard copy of the graph. This can be done with a graphics dump program like Zoom Graphics, but the new ProDos version can also do it directly if you have a Grappler+ Parallel Interface Card.

Also new is the ability to print the top part of a bar or line chart in a magnified form. This will accentuate small differences in large values.

The fourth new feature is the ability to print a title vertically as well as horizontally.

While it has some limitations, SoftGraph does a nice job. The graphs are limited to 18 sets of figures, legends of 8 characters, and four numbers in each set of figures.

Extensive instructions for using SoftGraph are included on the disk and can be sent to your printer under menu control.

As an added bonus you will find a new ProDos command called TYPE on the disk. Remember to copy ProDos and Basic.System onto the disk

DAUG Disk of the Month # 54 - November 1986

This Disk of the Month contains several useful graphics utilities as well as over 2 dozen interesting digitized graphics screens. The DoM includes a slide show program with special effects transitions and a graphics packer/unpacker.

The COMPACTOR Picture Packing Utility contains all needed operating instructions. It will take a normal 34 Sector Graphics file and compress it to between 7 and 24 Sectors depending on its complexity.

The instructions are very precise and even include a short (S lines) BASIC subroutine you can use in your own programs to utilize packed pictures one at a time.

You can speed up the Slide show program considerably by using a modified DOS, such as DiversiDos, a "Private Domain" or "Shareware" program available on Special DoM #5.

As promised, here's another DAUG Special Disk of PS Graphics for you. Altogether there are 70 new Graphics that you can access from Print Shop.

This time the Disk actually has a 'theme' to it...several themes, as a matter of fact. In the spirit of the holiday season coming up you will find 20 graphics with winter or Christmas themes as well as 23 graphics of a religious nature. Now you can dress up all your Christmas letters with appropriate decorations. In case you long for warmer climes, you can get in the mood by using the 28 graphics related to Hawaii. Also on this disk you will find the Print Shop. Slide Show program that will let you see 9 PS Graphics on screen at the same time. This program displays the Graphic AND its (itle on the screen.
