The backup for this program can be purchased from MECA on a yearly basis for \$39. For this fee, you may obtain any technical help required, as well as the update disks which usually come out about the first of each calendar year. Another feature of this backup is being able to replace any damaged disks at no cost.

NEWS FROM THE DISK LIBRARY: UPDATES, RECALLS, AND REVIEWS

UPDATES: If you have purchased DISK JOCKEY from our Disk Library, you may trade it for ULTRA-UTILITIES, a new addition to our Library which is similar to the old DISK JOCKEY. If you have purchased MUSIC AND EDUCATIONAL GAMES from our Library, you may trade it for our updated, debugged version of the same disk. Be advised that some programs on the latter disk have been dropped and that many, many others have been added.

REVIEWS: As noted above, we've just completed an in-depth revision of our MUSIC AND EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS. If you already have this disk, don't miss this opportunity to upgrade your software library. And if

you don't already have this disk, check it out! This disk is loaded, so packed with good programs that one of our members reports that it might be considered "too full." Most of the programs on this disk are in color; all are of fine quality and well-suited to families with children aged three to twelve. The following are just a few of the many, many programs on this disk.

For children aged three to five, we've included BABYMATH, TELLTIME, and TICKTOCK. BABYMATH is designed to teach a child to count, while TELLTIME and TICKTOCK are designed to teach a child to tell time. For school-aged children, we have math, reading, and spelling drills. Also, for this age group, we've selected MUSIC, a very friendly program which will help just about anyone learn to read music.

Many of the music programs on this disk are non-interactive. While these may simply entertain the very young, older children may be interested in LISTING these programs and learning how to program music with the PCjr.

The five-star programs on this disk are FUNSOUND (downloaded by our Modem Captain Jim Cox) and SEARCH. FUNSOUND is a series of non-interactive, well-programmed songs which are executed, one after the other, for 26 minutes. SEARCH generates Word Search or Find-a-Word puzzles which you can solve on the screen or print out.

MUSIC AND EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS is a great disk for young children. They'll probably tire of the music programs after a few weeks, but several of the educational programs will keep them interested over a much longer period of time. If I had children, no question about it, I'd pick this one up for them.

New in our Library this month is MATH TUTOR. The program is a well-written, first-class multiplication, addition, subtraction and division tutorial for grades one through six. No bells, no whistles, no cute musical phrases, and no animated graphics. The program, however, is in color. Don't expect this program to look or operate like the other math tutorial in our Library, FUNNELS AND BUCKETS. MATH TUTOR is drier, but more challenging. The package is menu-driven and is well-documented. Just access the instructions from within the program and page through them on the screen.

If you're looking for a straightforward, no-nonsense math tutorial, then pick MATH TUTOR. However, if you're looking for an educational game, I'd advise you to take a look at the other disks in our library. - Mary Burich -



Anyone with an internal modem and a Racore or Quadram second disk may be interested in the following item.

One OK (OK PCjr Users Group, Oklahoma City) jr owner found out that such a combination may result in loss of data or apparent failure of the modem. His modem board checked out okay when he put it back in his computer. It turned out that the reason for the problem was his second disk drive. Its power supply circuit board is right above the modem and was generating a magnetic field which zapped the data coming in. With some shielding installed, the modem worked fine.

DOS-PATCH

Are you getting some strange messages from your DOS from time to time? We all get them, but it has come to our attention that some of our members are still using the DOS 2.1 that came with their Juniors and have NOT installed the DOS-PATCH program that is in the DISK Library. It has been there for some time, but we have some newer members who may not know that this program is available or that it is needed. We also have some folks that feel the instructions for DOS-PATCH are not all that user-friendly. See me and I will make it a point to either give you the program on loan, come to your house, or you can come over with your DOS disks to my house and we will get the patch made to your copies. Sometimes, one-on-one is the best way to get these things done. This includes PC-FILE or WRITING ASSISTANT into the RAM drive!

This offer of one-on-one is extended to other programs that you may be having trouble running. Just remember that I'm limited to just a few programs! When I got back home, I formatted each and every one of them. Have you ever sat down and formatted one hundred disks, one at a time? When this was done, I inventoried the stock box for the Club to see which disks needed to be replaced from the last meeting, and did a "diskcopy" of seven disks.

On Tuesday, I made up some booting disks of PC-FILE and WRITING ASSISTANT to use for the program that Bruce Bayne and I were to put on at the September meeting. After eating lunch, I called up the JRCLUB.DOC that we are putting on all of the disks and made revisions to it to reflect the disks we have removed from inventory and the changes we have made to some others. After supper, I copied JRCLUB.DOC to 108 disks that are in the stock box; you know, "COPY JRCLUB.DOC B: 108 times at the A>."

On Wednesday, I started going through the notes Mary had given me when I picked up the library from her. I added MONOPOLY to the JRCLUB.DOC file, updated the 27 DOS Utilities by deleting those programs that neither Mary nor I could get working, and added some more to the disk (which only brought it up to 26 utilities). I called up the DOC file and copied the instructions on how the new utilities worked, and then copied it all back to the original disk, made copies of it for the stock box, and changes to the JRCLUB.DOC.

Thursday came. I had to finish up early as Junior had to be dismantled so it could be carried into the meeting. I typed up some handouts for the RAM demo Bruce and I were to do, drove over to the 3-cent copy place on 13th and copied the two handouts and the new Junior Club DOC listing of our programs. I only made ten copies of that, as it changes daily. Then I came home and took the computer apart.

Friday was spent putting it all back together, replacing the disks that were sold from the Library, and going through some more of Mary's notes on what did and did not work with the Library disks. We went to a play on Friday night, so I couldn't get much done.

Saturday morning, I spent at the computer doing the newsletter for another club Elleen and I belong to. I made a copy of it, printed mailing labels with PC-FILE, and it was off to the 3-cent copy place again. I folded and stuck labels and stamps in the afternoon, and they were in the mail by five.

On Sunday, the neighbor came over. She didn't have anything to do because her husband had gone fishing. I always thought that fishing was MY hobby!

If you have version 2.11 or earlier of FLIGHT SIMULATOR, there is a bug in it (for the Junior only!). On some monitors, the colors will fade in and out. If you call Microsoft's Customer Service number, they have a fix. 1-800-828-8088.

In BASIC, use WIDTH 80 to get 80 columns on the screen instead of going out to DOS with the MODE command. If you can't recall the spelling of a file you need, use the files command while in BASIC. Ex: FILES "B:*.*)" will list all the files on the B drive disk.

PROGRAMS FOR IBM PCjrs BUT NOT FOR IBM PCs

Software manufacturers are getting over the shock of the demise of the PCjr and are good about including it when designing most programs. As we all know, there are some things that are better about the PCjr than any other IBM PC, especially the color and sound generation capabilities.

More programs are being made specifically for the PCjr. There is added impetus for doing this as the TANDY 1000 is very similar to the PCjr in many ways. This increases the number of computers enough to make it cost-effective for some software companies. The slight programming differences between the Junior and the 1000 are relatively easy to adjust to.

This finally gets me around to my main point. I am finding that there are some programs for the Junior that I wasn't aware of such as GHOSTBUSTERS, THE MUSIC STUDIO, etc. It is because most mail order houses won't list just for the Junior and if the program won't run on a PC, it isn't included in their ads.

The problem for us Junior owners is how to find out about these programs. That's where our user group can prove helpful. Let me know if you know of these kinds of PCjr-specific programs and I will compile a list of them for the Newsletter. I think some of the software stores are also ignorant of this situation and we can get the list out to them so too, can help get the word out.

PRINTER POTENTIAL

Many of us have printers with untapped potential. They are capable of printing double-width or compressed characters. They can emphasize or enhance the print.

Our printer manuals come with codes and escape sequences to utilize these features. But all this becomes too complicated for many of us. Fortunately, we have help right in our own Club Disk Library. There are five different programs that utilize many of these printer features and produce various fonts or printing styles: PC-DESKMATES, TYPERITE, PC-FONT, FONTMENU, and PC-WRITE. Two of these programs are specifically for setting printers and the others have font settings as a feature of a larger program. All of the programs are compatible with the Epson line of printers and the IBM Graphics Printer. PC-DESKMATES will work with any IBM compatible dot matrix printer. PC-WRITE will work with any printer. And there is evidence that the other three programs are not exclusive to Epson or IBM Graphics printers. The best way to know if your printer is compatible is to try it.

PC-DESKMATES is one of the easiest and friendliest ways to make simple changes in printing styles. A menu-window appears at the touch of a keystroke while you are using another program, offering two sizes (double-wide and compressed) and two densities (emphasized and enhanced) and some combinations. You may also use these fonts with the typewriter function on the menu.

TYPERITE offers the same font options as above plus superscript, subscript, bold, underline and more combinations. You may use these options with this typewriter-emulating program or load another program and the font setting will remain. To change fonts, you must reload the TYPERITE program.

PC-FONT sets your printer for condensed, compressed, double-wide characters in combination with double-strike, emphasized, and correspondence densities. There are also four line-spacing options and the ability to print 243 characters. (The Epson printers normally will print only 96; IBM 196). It is also possible to change fonts within a document.

FONTMENU has all the options of the other programs plus some additions including graphics settings and foreign language characters. This menu-driven program is the most comprehensive and probably the best if you just want to set your printer.

PC-WRITE is a word-processing program that offers most of the popular font options. It can be completely customized to your printer and keyboard; so if nothing else works, this will. It, however, will take some fiddling and studying the manual before you can start printing.

Having the ability to change fonts easily can be very useful. Compressed print can be used to print large spreadsheet output or on-disk program manuals, double-strike or enhanced for near-letter-quality correspondence, double-wide for overhead transparencies, condensed for diskette directory labels. If you haven't experimented with font control, our Disk Library is ready to serve you.

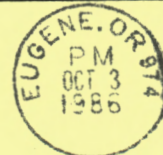
