





- 1. The July 7 meeting of the SN99ers UG was called to order by Pres. BJ Mathis at 7:15pm at the new meeting place at Devon Gables.
- VPres. Ed Hallett conducted the Question and Answer period.
  - 9. How does one save data statements within a program to a file, search a data entry and resave to a different file?
  - A. The second file must be in an appropriate file length and type. Read back from file - use input statement.

Al has also taken it upon himself to get the Advanced Languages Norkshop on a course of learning. Al is an excellent source for solving Assembly Language and hardware problems. - 3. BJ reported on the line officers meeting of June 27.
  - a. It was decided to order for the UG Library: TI-99/4A Hardware Nanual for \$19.95. Asgard Magazine subscription at \$6 for four quarterly issues. The Writers Nanual (Condensed version of TE-Writer Manual) at \$1.70 for ten or more copies.
  - b. The schedule of special programs for the business meetings for the balance of the year was set up.

August - Al Armstrong - More on Disk Drives September - Al Armstrong - Fix-It Program Eric Stollard - LOGO Overview October - Jack Mathis - Printer "Magic" Dave Wolfson - Programming Philosophy November - Jack Mathis - Basic & ExBasic Tricks Ed Hallett - Future's Workshop December - Christmas Party January - Election of Officers for the coming year.

- c. Planning another order of Disk Drives in September, if at least ten are ordered. TEAC 1/2 Ht Drives (including cables) will cost about \$170.00 a pair.
- d. Modems can be ordered by anyone at anytime for about \$70.00 plus 5% handling charge, since we cannot get a price break.
- 4. Financial Report:

Checking Account Balance \$1550 Liabilities: Fairware Author Donations - \$10 Designated for BBS Upgrade - \$315 Newsletter (6 Months) - \$360 Total Liabilities - \$775 Required Bank Minimum - \$500 Balance available - \$275 + dues for the balance of year & other incidental income, for Antfarm Support, buying disks, etc. (Bank service charge is \$8/month if balance is less than the \$500 minimum.)

Disks cost about \$300 for 500 and would be a major purchase, so it is important we keep our bank balance at \$300 or more above the \$500 minimum.

5. VPrss and SYSOP Ed Hallett reported on the status of the BBS (Ant Farm).

The group's computer system is used on the BBS, which he maintains at his home. The cost of operation for electricity and a separate phone line is about \$28 per month. Ed supported the BBS for the first year of operation and is now asking the group to participate in the support of the system, due to his current financial situation.

The 888 enables group members to leave messages, up-load and down-load messages, programs and files. It has been in operation for a year and a half now. About 2400 calls have been made to date.

- .Ida McCarger moved that the group underwrite the cost of the BBS at \$10.00 per month. Motion was seconded by Joe Lenox.
- Several individuals have supported the BBS on a month to month basis (Bill Queen, Jack Mathis, Leon Dorros, Aaron Traiger, Ida McCarger and Ed McCullough).

Benefits of the Ant Farm to the group as a whole include:

- a. Fairware programs down-loaded and up-loaded from National Network Services
- b. Knowledge sharing within the group.
- c. Experience in using Telecommunications equipment and procedures.
- d. Available to out of state members.

The system provides 1000 sectors for down-loading. Plans are to double this capacity and increase speed with a MYARC Controller.

Prorated cost per member per year would be about \$6, for the 58 members.

The sotion passed.

- A copy of the Lending Library Periodical List was made available to all members.
- New Business cards are available for the members to use, to give to people who are known to have TI equipment. Put your own name or an officer's name on it.
- 8. A TI system is available for sale.
- An Advanced Diagnostics Program packet is available to the club to be raffled off. The raffle idea was not working, so the program was sold to Rod Stallard.
- Demonstrations were given by Ida McCarger PRBase and Rod Stollard - Forth.

Publications. Arcade-style games, data base management, a sophisticated character editor, and much more, provide something for every TI user." Please call if there is anything you would like from the library at our August meeting (294-3024) or leave a message on the Ant Farm. You may ask for a specific book, books on a subject, Newsletters from a specific group, Newsletters with special articles on subjects such as FORTH, PASCAL, A/L, ExBasic, Ram Disks etc., or just a pack of recent Newsletters. I will not be bringing the 3 boxes full of all the newsletters. You are also welcome to come to my home and pick up anything you need between meetings. We also have Assembly, TI Writer, Super Extended Basic, and a few cassettes to loan. Beginners or new members should be checking into some of the informative material we have.

The disk of the month has a second lesson on the constellations, an article by Barry Traver, and a Wheel of Fortune game that plays like the one on TV--the author regrets that memory limitations prevented him from including Vanna and the prizes. Have fun!

### CATLIB COMPANION REVIEW




A few months ago I did a review of the latest version of Catlib by Marty Kroll. In that review I mentioned that Mr. Kroll stated at the end of the doc file that a "companion" program was coming out to be used in conjunction with Catlib. Well Catlib Companion is here at last.

Upon booting the program you are faced with a menu that is as straight forward as the menu in Catlib. What Companion does is load the data and disk files from Catlib and allow you to add keywords and comments to each file in your library. It thus creates a database of commented files/disks and allows you to create nicely formatted printouts of this information. Clean and simple.

I found the program easy to use and very forgiving if you blunder from time to time. One real nice feature is if you delete some files from your Catlib data, Companion will update its file if you choose. The documentation that comes with Catlib Companion is well written and complete and will have you using this fine program in no time at all. All in all another fine program from this prolific fairware writer! In sy earlier reveiw of Catlib I said that Catlib was a "must have" for anyone with a disk system. On working with Companion I can't go as far to say that. The file data and comments that Companion produces are among the most complete that can be had in this type of program. However, keep in mind that YOU must assign all keywords and comments. If you have a library of 500-2000 files this setup could take quite some time. Companion is the type of program that will give you only what you put in it. Companion is a good name for this program, because only the end user can decide if the things Catlib Companion does are worth the set up time involved.

In conclusion I recommend that everyone who has Catlib check this program out and see if it will enhance your diskfile tracking.





#### GOOD OLD DAYS ARE COMING BACK!

Remember those good old days of 1982-84 when there were loads of books and magazines for us TIers? When we could buy text materials for our computer faster than we could read and use them?

Methinks these days may be returning. At least a little.

At recent fairs and meeting I've attended there has been lots of talk about the disappearing textware in the TI World Community. No more books. No more magazines. No more...

Actually, there is more good, intelligent, useful TI stuff being written for textware today than there was four or five years ago. It's just that most of it is being written by users in user groups, not by some writer in an ivory tower somewhere. Most of these new writings are free (in newsletters with membership or in exchanges with other groups) and readily available.

Someday, I'd love to publish a list of my favorite dozen newsletters worldwide, but then the IMPACT column may be reduced to only 12 publications.

So much for that idea.

Joining a user group, even by mail if there aren't any nearby, may be the most sensible investment a 99er could make.

However, there are still lots of other sources for textware in our fellowship.

COMPUTER SHOPPER (\$21 for 12 monthly issues) P.O. Box 1419, Titusville, FL 32781-9988. This 10 X 14 500-plus page giant is probably the best single source for inexpensive disks, drives, cables, monitors, printers, what-have-you. It also has a listing of user groups (Check to see if yours is there.) and a TI classified section. But the reason most of us subscribe is the TI FORUM written by Ron Albright and John littrain. These two guys have a folksy approach to the realm of TI computing. Their monthly articles are full of wit and information and lots of heady reviews and oredictions.

MICROpendium (\$20 for 12 monthly issues) P.O. Box 1343, Round Rock, TX 78680. This is the best magazine source for all TI owners, from super techie all the way down the ladder to people like myself. The 40-page newsprint periodical is totally devoted to the TI world and is as up-to-date as one can get. If you can only afford one TI magazine, this is probably the one. (John Zittrain, Ron Albright, Barry Traver, Chris Bobbitt, and Bruce Forbes are probably going to kill me for saying that.)

ASGARD NEWS (\$6 for 4 quarterly issues) P.O. Box 10306, Rockville, MD 20850. Though this magazine is fairly new, the editor - Chris Bobbitt - has been programming and writing steadily for the TI community since his teenage years. So it's a natural step up to see a full-fledged magazine come out. Most of the first issue was devoted to previews of coming attractions and reviews of many of Asgard's products. Each issue, though, has an extended article (the 9640 vs the 99/8, for example) and editorials and regular columns and corners. Lots of small, helpful hints and comments are given on a variety of TI subjects.

Genial TRAVelER (\$36 for a one-year, six-disk subscription; \$65 for a two-year subscription. These subscriptions also have bonuses.) 835 Green Valley Drive, Philadelphia, PA 19128. In a way Barry Traver's diskazines are not strictly a hardcopy magazine, but the DV/80 files dumped will give you the equivalent of a novel. To be a 99er with a disk drive and not have this service is to live a deprived life. These are packed! Really packed disks of an incredible variety of things for the TI: music, utilities, games, wordprocessing, everything else. Far less than a penny a sector, these disks may be ordered as Volume One (the set already complete), Volume Two (still some to come), or both. I would recommend Volume One first.

All of the above you may already own or at least know about. But there is another text/disk setup out there that is really worth discovering. It's been around since September of '87, and it is another large value for we 99ers, though it just hasn't gotten the attention many other TI efforts have gotten.

TId Bits is a bimonthly magazine for only \$8 (6 issues) for hardcopy or \$12 (6 issues) for disk (SSSD flippy). The disk contains lots of additional PD and Fairware stuff to extend to two sides. The magazine contains photos and graphics.

It may be hard to make a decision about which version to get - disk or text. Although the disk contains the exact text of the hardcopy (and a lot of other surprise goodies besides), I personally am partial to the hardcopy for a number of reasons.

TId Bits pilot issue contained some screen photos, graphics of an envelope cataloguer, and a screen graphic to go along with a program printed out.

The next issues, however, contained some of the best photographs I have ever seen of the internal structure of our computer. The text talks about chip replacements and gives some very precise, easy-to-follow photographs and enlargements that make the process very logical, very clear, and ~ even to a non-techie like myself - very unfrighteningly practical.

It's one thing to see drawings (which are also in a the magazine), but it's quite another to have step-by-step photographs of the entire process.

These magazines are jam-packed with all kinds of stuff that you don't find in MICROpendium, ASGARD NEWS, or - because of the nature of the zine - Genial TRAVelER.

Bruce supplies the reader with all kinds of inside information on a large variety of things for us 99ers. Lots of prices of things. Lots of addresses. Lots of reviews. Lots of programs.

It's a one-man operation at this point, and each issue gets better and better.

Bruce has promised to continue this magazine through at least one year's subscription. And hardcopies of all past issues will be available through 1988 with each subscription. The disk versions will continue to be available, I assume, for a long time to come. Newsletter editors may be interested in getting this version for an excellent source of some interesting material.

Bruce says of his excellent efforts, "A lot of thought went into the pricing of TId Bits. We were keeping in mind that the TI community has leen shafted too many times. Therefore, we set a break-even factor projected to December 1988. If we should pick up a sponsor or advertiser throughout the year, those funds would be used to lure a TI Brain to produce unique articles for us." [I'm available, Bruce.]

"We are committed to 1988 and are cautiously optimistically looking to 1989. If the world doesn't end or the TI community completely collapse we project some kind of survival into 1989 and beyond."

Hoor ay!

Writers and programmers and techies and non-techies, take note! Here is a good source for you to get those articles and designs and comic strips published.

Readers, here is another great TI source that needs

all our support. For only \$8 we could be supporting our own futures with our fabulous machines.

HELPFUL HINT OF THE MONTH

This has to do with TI WRITER (or any version: FUNNELWEB, BA WRITER, whatever).

Did you know you can type anything you want after a carriage return ON THE SAME LINE and it won't print out. But it'll SAVE. This is great for text notes for screen reading. I've used this a lot, particularly when I'm writing articles or poems. Very handy.

Also handy is the space use in LF and SF.

When you LF and there is already a DSK2.HEMENWAY up there on auto and you want to load DSK2.KDN6, all you have to do is type the KDN6 and press the Spacebar and Enter, even though it'll say DSK2.KON6 WAY on the screen. Actually, you can even SAVE a file with a long (up to 80-col) note after a filename and space. This will disk SAVE and screen read but not print out. Lots of handy reasons for this on working disks.

Another handy-dandy is letter saving. If you write as many letters as I do (between 30 and 40 a week), it's a good idea to let your FUNNELWEB do the sorting and hard work for you. Just name the letter by date and name in the following way. If I write to Jim Peterson on May 17 I would SAVE the file as DSK2.517JIMPETE. Always month first (5) followed by day (17) and the name as far as it'll go. So if I wrote to Jim on November 27 it would be 1127JIMPET, but if I wrote on April Fool's Day it would be 41JIMPETER. This is also handy if you write a lot of letters on the same day, as TI WRITER will sort them for cataloguing first by number then by letter. So they will be numerically AND alphabetically sorted in the catalog.

Have any handy-dandys of your own (or ones you've come across)? Send them along. I'll be happy to IMPACT them for you, with full credit, of course.


