

.NOTES FROM THE FAIRE

Despite the rigors of "stand-by" flying, My brother and I managed to get to San Fran in time to attend the 7th West Coast Computer Faire (the trailing 'e' is silent). As any of you who attended last year's Midwest Computer Show at McCoraick Place can confirm, attending computer shows is kind of "hit-or-miss" - one year they're good, the next they're not worth the gas to drive to them. Such is not the case for the Faire. Year after year, Jim Warren and his bunch manage to put on a SHOW. Ask Terry Batt of Midwest Microcomputers about it. This year's Faire is no exception. Steve Gibson

exception.. After stumbling through the crowds in the upstairs exhibition area (attendance was predicted at 60,000+), my brother and I noticed that there were quite a few exhibitors we couldn'T find. Checking our program (free with registration, the Program contained the show location, address, phone number, and type of business each exhibitor engages in), we noticed that the exhibitors we hadn't seen were all located in Brooks Hall. Quickly locating the escalator to Brooks Hall, we descended. As our alltitude decreased we were faced with a panorama that drew involuntary "geeezz!" and "wow!" for here was an exhibition area about the size of the yearly Auto Show here in Chicago — and this was just half of the Show!

Here was Scott Adams of Adventure, Int'l surrounded by

Here was Scott Adams of Adventure. Int'l surrounded by reporters with cameras and note pads. And over here was a reporters with cameras and note pags. And over here was a youthful Jeff Konyu (co-author of most Big Five software - like Robot Attack) telling about how he's turning his attention to Atari game programming (a loss for TRS-80 gamers). Upstairs, Steve Ciarcia of Byte magazine and Micro-Mint was fielding questions about his excellent hardware column in Byte. The folks from Softtalk and Softline were swamped with folks accepting complimentary subscriptions to their mags. Exatron was showing (..and solling) at least two new products - a AAR RAM card that selling) at least two new products - a 64k RAM card that fits inside the IRS-80 Model I keyboard and a Model I charactor Generator based on a 2716 EPROM. I talked to the west coast distributor of the Signalman Modem (see last month's ad from ICOM for details) who told me of a new Dual Disk system with one drive a 5-1/4" Floppy and the other a Hard Disk with a removable cartridge, all in a beautiful oak case and intially available for the APPLE, TRS-80, and XEROX - retailing for - less than \$2000!!

On the 3rd floor was an insurance agent selling insurance policies for Home Computers and SOFTWARE (up to \$7500!) at a yearly rate of \$50 (he told me that this type of policy will be available in the Chicago area this summer). Micro Coop from St. Charles was there (Dave was fresh from the Barrington Computertown Show and was headed for the EIGHTY-APPLE Show in New York). User groups were well represented, including the original APPLE Corps.

Music filled the air in certiain sections as the folks from Albarratary and Savandaharan descriptions.

Alphasyntauri and Soundchaser demonstarted their APPLE-based music systems. Software was also being demonstrated, and the people at Nasir had a great crowd around their booth watching Horizon V on a big screen TV (talk about vertigo!) And though I can't remember who was selling it, Swashbuckler had just as big a crowd.

The American Free Enterprise System was very much alive at the show, and discounts were common and heavy (at least 15%). I witnessed some healthy debate between Dealers concerning dicounts and one Discounter told an irate programmer, "Why don'T you take your program back?"

There were also seminars and lectures at the show, though I didn't get a chance to attend. Topics ranged from "Introduction to Business Programming" to Keyboard Konsiderations".

All-in-all a very entertaining, interesting, and worthwhile Faire, and I applaud Jim Warren.

I promise to be at the 8th Faire and hope to arrange a Group Package so that more of you can come along!

BYTE BY BYTE By Mark Schaub

Sometimes when you need to do a certain task, you write a small program to accomplish it. After you get the bare bones of the program down, you see some ways to make it more universal. Such is the case with this program. I have a BSR home-controller connectted to my #1 cassette port. Whenever I wanted to play an arcade game (like GALAXIAN) I had to go into BASIC and PRINT#-2, A to get my cassette to output to port #2, so I could hear the sounds. This is a real pain if you're using a DOS. For this reason I wrote CASS/CMD.

The program, as written, will not work for a cassette-based machine. (But then if you have a cassette-based machine you don't have this problem.) This program will switch between cassette port #1 and port #2 from DOS. If you don't specify which port you want, you'll get an error message. The format of the command is: EASS X where X is either 1 or 2 depending on which port you want active. The comments after each line tell how this utility



(312) 628-8955

(3) Gently spray the male end of the ribbon cable with the Control Cleaner/Lubricant and wait a few minutes.

(4) Again gently spray the male end of the ribbon cable with the Anti-Corrosion Silicone and again wait a few minutes.

(5) Now reseat the ribbon cable using an ample pressure to be sure that there is very solid connection.

DISKETTES:

(A) Buy a good heavy-duty Bulk Magnetic Eraser that is used for cassettes, cartridges, and reel-to-reel tapes.

(B) Always magnetically erase ALL new Diskettes, despite whatever the manufacturer says. I had five out of ten Diskettes one time that didn't work with my TRS-80 until I used the bulk eraser on them. And these were the best" (most expensive) diskettes that could be had according to the manufacturer.

(C) Always bulk erase all of your old Diskettes that you going to re-use for

something else.

(D) Buy a Disk Drive Head Cleaning Kit, especially if you are a "smoker". It only takes a minute amount of dirt, dust, magnetic oxide, or nicotine particles on your Disk heads to cause problems. your

RS-232-C BOARD:

Since I am just in TRS-80 beginn**er** communications, I will not say anything about that subject. I have received some good advice from various individuals that helped me out though. Let's hope that they will write an article about communications Preventive Maintenance for The WACO Post.

In summary, I have found that I can prevent almost all of those "strange" quirks and glitches bу just doing Preventive Maintenance. My own schedule for doing PM is flexible, but I nepally flexible, but I usually perform the task once a month

which seems to be adequate for
